ALLIES TO RENEW ARMISTICE

INSURRECTION REIGNS THROUGHOUT RUMANIA

Rumania Is Seething BRITAIN TO with Insurrection, King CLAIM ENTIRE Is Wounded by Rioters

Royal Family Is Prevented From Making Flight From Bucharest to Jassy - Rebels Openly Demand Overthrow of Dynasty.

Berlin, Feb. 12.-A general insurrection is in progress throughout Rumania, according to a special dispatch from Vienna. King Ferdinand has been wounded slightly in attempting to flee from Bucharest with the royal family.

Workingmen blocked the roadway from the royal palace when the royal family attempted to flee to Jassy, and the king and Commission Is Now Considerhis family were forced to return. The king was wounded when the workers, according to the report, fired upon the royal palace. Rioters in the streets of Bucharest are openly demanding the overthrow of the dynasty, crying "Down with the puppets; long

live the republic! A Budapest newspaper learns that the revolt is part of Bolshevik propaganda. In a clash between the military and demonstrators at Bakorst 60 persons were killed and 150 wounded.

The discipline of the Rumanian army, the newspaper adds, is actually caused, it was announced in collapsing. HERBERT PRINGLE, MILLIONAIRE CORN KING BORN IN SEAFORTH, DIES AT HOME IN CALIFORNIA

Man Who Never Had an Enemy, Never Lost a Friend, or Never Said "No" to an Appeal For Aid Expires Near Pasadena.

Chicago, Feb. 13 .- Herbert Pringle, a member of the Chicago Board of Trade, died yesterday near Pasadena, Cal. No man in the grain trade ever had more friends than "Bob" Pringle. It is said of him that he never had an enemy and never lost a friend. He could not say "no" to an appeal for aid. He was a favorite on the board of trade, and at the Chicago Athletic Association, where he spent most of his time. He made a million in corn more than ten years ago, and sank much of it in Alaska mines and other western ventures, but in the last five years he retrieved his fortune. It was nothing for him to buy or sell 1,000,000 bushels of corn at a time, with only one word or a motion of his hand. Mr. Pringle was born in Seaforth, Ont., In 1866. He came to Chicago in 1881. He is survived by a brother, James Pringle of Milwaukee.

Washington, Feb. 13.-The total cost of the war to all belligerents, including the central powers, was placed at \$193,000,000,000 by Secretary Baker in an address here last night at the American Women's "Victory Dinner." Paris.
