

PLAN TO SPEND \$250,000 FOR SEWAGE PLANT

**Will Likely Mean Start of a
Sanitary System For
West London.**

Proposals to build a sewage-disposal plant, replacing the present sewage beds as forecasted by The Advertiser, have now come to a head. City Engineer Brazier has been instructed to interview the provincial board of health in regard

The plant will take care of the sewerage from most of the city, and will cost at least \$250,000 to build. Its construction likely will mean a commencement of a sanitary sewerage system for West London. No sewers have been laid there because there is no outlet for them, but if a new plant is built, the system can be connected with this arrangement for pumping the sewage from the lower level of that part of the city. Plans for the system will be drawn up immediately by the city engineering department.

Work will be commenced as soon as possible and it is hoped that the disposal plant will be ready by the time the city's new disposal plant is completed. The new plant is located on the type which it is proposed to build already exists in the city, being located near the south branch of the river. The new plant likely will be located somewhere in the vicinity of the present sewerage beds west of the city on the south branch of the river.

Definite decision to undertake work may result in the public utility commission taking immediate action to build a new dam at Springfield. It is claimed that the horsepower would be developed and the increase in the flow of the river is urged.
