Will Likely Mean Start of a Sanitary System For West London.

Proposals to build a sewage-disposal plant, replacing the present sewage beds, as forecasted by The Advertiser, have now come to a head. City Engineer Brazier has been instructed to interview the provincial board of health in regard to details of the plans.

The plant will take care of the sewage from most of the city, and will cost at least \$250,000 to build. Its construction likely will mean a commencement of a sanitary sewerage system for West London. No sewers have been laid there because there is no outlet for west London. No sewers nave been laid there because there is no outlet for them, but if a new plant is built, the system can be connected with this and pumps can be installed for pumping the sewage from the lower level of that part of the city. Plans for the system will be drawn up immediately by the city engineering department. Work will be commenced as soon as

Work will be commenced as soon as possible and it is hoped that the disposal plant will be ready by the time this work is completed. A disposal plant of the type which it is proposed to build already exists in the city, being located near the south branch of the river. This drains only a comparatively small section. The new plant likely would be located somewhere in the vicinity of the present sewage beds west of the city on the main branch of the river.

Definite decision to undertake the Definite decision to undertake the work may result in the public utilities commission taking immediate action to build a new dam at Springbank. 


