STRUCK A NEWSBOY AND GOES TO JAIL

James Anderson Fined \$10 and Costs or 30 Days for Brutal and Unprovoked Assault.

For a cowardly assault upon James Rundle, a newsboy, James Anderson, a big man of 35 years of age, was sent to jail by Magistrate Kingsford in police court yesterday morning.

The assault occurred in Yonge-street at 11.30 o'clock Saturday night. Rundle, with two other boys, were selling The Sunday World. Anderson approached and chided one of the boys, calling "wee-wee." He struck at the boy, but did not hurt him. Later he asked the lad for a paper, but the boy refused to sell to him. He then asked Rundle for a paper. He struck his hand into his pocket as if to take out the money, but as the boy, who is a slight little chap, was handing him the paper, Anderson struck him with his clenched fist above the left eye, knocking the little fellow down.

Then Anderson made off thru the crowd. Rundle was too stunned to follow, but his two companions stuck to the heels of the assailant of their friend until they came to the corner of Scott, to whom they complained. The officer took Anderson into custody and he was locked up at the Agnes-street station where a charge of assault was laid. He was held in the jail over Sunday without bail.

Arrested by the magistrate yesterday morning Anderson pleaded guilty. "Whatever made you do so cowardly and brutal a thing?" asked the magistrate when Crown Attorney Corley had explained the circumstances. "I don't know," replied Anderson. "I was drinking all week and must have lost my senses."

COUNCIL AGREED TO CONFER WITH CATARACT

Manager Hawkins Wrote That He Would Confirm Interview Offering Low Power Price.

HAMILTON, April 27.—(Special.)—At this evening's session of the council the question of holding an informal conference with the Cataract Power Company to see the best rates the company would quote for power. Manager Hawkins wrote, stating that he would confirm the interview he gave to the papers, that the company would give a better rate than the hydro-electric power commission.

W. A. H. Duff formally notified the mayor that Miss Jeanette Lewis would hand over her books and accounts to the city auditors, although she would let the trustees inspect her books. No action was taken.

The cells at No. 3 police station were condemned as being worse than any Russian prison, by an account of lack of funds no action was taken. The residents of Euclid-avenue protested against the building of a convalescent hospital on the City Hospital grounds. Ald. McLaren accused the hospital governors of tampering with the aldermen in getting Copeland-avenue closed for this purpose. Nothing could be done, as it developed that there was not a quorum present.

Chester Fearman was re-appointed to the cemetery board. Ald. Farrar and Farmer protested because the city proposed to cut off the practice of supplying water to Barton residents, but they got no support. Ald. Dickson accused them of representing Barton.

By a vote of 6 to 2 it was agreed to purchase a trenching machine. Ald. Peregrine asked that the practice of having the city auditors go over the financial accounts be discontinued, but he was not voted. He claimed that the city was losing money by having its auditors direct from the city.

Dr. Roberts, the medical health officer, reported to the board of health this evening that there were eight more cases of smallpox, all of which could be traced to the home of Mrs. Goodman, Sanford-avenue. The Isolation Hospital will be opened again. The smallpox has cost the city \$8000 since last September. Some fault was found because the patients were allowed to wear hats, etc. A pound and a half of the quarantined people ordered up oysters and all sorts of delicacies at the expense of the city. C. Wilkins, driver of the mayor's ambulance, will get \$60 a month in the future.

Fire destroyed two frame stables belonging to E. Fenwick at the corner of John and Hunter-streets to-night. Joseph Fitzgerald was arrested this afternoon, charged with aggravated assault on his mother.

D. McAllister, a youth, was locked up to-night, charged with stealing a watch from the Ontario Lumber Company. Hon. George W. Ross addressed the Canadian Club this evening at the luncheon at the Hotel Royal on the National significance of the Battle of the Plains of Abraham. William McCreary, president of the club, was in the chair.

Altho the call to Rev. A. E. Mitchell, Ottawa, is being very largely signed by members of Knox Church, a faction has refused to sign. Rev. Father O'Reilly, formerly rector of St. Patrick's Church here, died in Ontario this morning. He was 55 years of age and was ordained 28 years ago by Bishop Crinnon. He was stationed at the following parishes: Assumption, Caledonia, Brantford, Mount Forest and Arthur. He had many friends among all classes in this city.

At the police court this morning L. C. Denz with selling liquor without a license in a shack at the steel plant. The inspector said he saw men and women drinking in the shack. Judgment was reserved. The county council has an overdraft of \$719, and needs \$55,000 for good roads in order to raise that amount the tax rate will have to be increased. TOO MANY HONORARY DEGREES Victoria College Believes Practice Has Been Overdone. Victoria College convocation to-night will be unique in two ways—there will be no conferring of honorary degrees and the graduating class of theology of 36 is probably the largest that any Canadian college has yet had. The class itself is a very large one, numbering 205. It was felt that the colleges have been too liberal with their honorary degrees. President Falconer of the university will give an address.

Auction Sale of Valuable Paintings. On Wednesday afternoon there will be an auction of pictures in Henderson's Art Gallery, which will put on sale some of the most valuable pictures ever offered in an auction room in this city. The consignment is by English, French and Dutch artists of the highest order, and will be sold without reserve. Probably the gem of the whole collection is "The Boy with the Red Hat," by J. M. W. Turner, which is a Dutch study of a child with paint-box and palette, "Sheep in Pasture," by Jacques-Louis David, and "Paris Pastoral scenes that will merit, and will probably have, active competition before they are finally secured. Two French boulevard scenes—"Outside of Paris," by Cortes, and "Paris Boulevard at Night," by Tullis—are very good. Two school scenes by Henjens and some French animal studies, compete for the next best place on the list of artistic ability. The only Canadian artist represented in the collection is H. H. Vickers, whose canvases, "Sunset Woods, Staffordshire" and "Near Bristol," and two animal scenes are admirably executed. Henderson's gallery which is the only auction one not lighted artificially, will afford the buyers a good opportunity to view their prospective purchases.

Ice Breaker a Success. OTTAWA, April 27.—The marine department has been advised that the government steamer Lady Grey has succeeded in breaking up the fast of ice in Lake St. Peter below Montreal, which enables navigation to be opened to Montreal from a week to ten days earlier than would otherwise have been possible.
