One after another of late the railway lines have been giving notice that temporarily grain shipments could not be accepted. This was especially the case today, and infimately proceeded to such an extent that nearly all roads from Chicago east were shown to be involved in a general congestion of facilities, a choke-up due in a measure to the evident impossibility of obtaining an adequate number of ocean freight vessels for immediate salling.

In the last 30 minutes of trading the wheat crowd, stirred by accumulating details of this situation and by reports of numerous successes of the German submarines as well as by the torpeto boat raid on the English coast, threw wheat holdings on the market with a reckless energy that has seldom been equaled. Turkish Government's Attitude Puts Washington in a Quandary.


