"What's in a Name?" Facts about your name; its history; its meaning; whence it was derived; its significance; your lucky day and lucky jewel. By MILDRED MARSHALL.

Irma is one of the many feminine names derived from Teutonic mythology. Its evolution is somewhat involved, and it cannot be definitely determined when or how its final form, which comes to us as Irma, was reached. It is evidently the Anglicization of a patently Teutonic form. "Irma" is, "enough," it signifies "public peace," as one might suppose. Tracing Irma back to its mythological origin, it is revealed that the third son of Mannus was said to be Er, a deity worshipped as Erman or Ermin. The evolution of this word thru German nomenclature is irrelevant here, but the curious fact remains that its feminine form appears in Teutonic language as Hermine, not Irminde or Irma, as one might suppose. In Italy, however, the name Ermeninda arose and named a saintly virgin of the sixth century. Spain had already received Irmin, and had proceeded to give it various interpretations, until a certain Herminburga was discovered among the royal princesses. QUEBEC LUMBERMEN WATCH FOREST FIRES

Montreal, June 3.—Lumbering interests with offices here have been watching the progress of the forest fires of New Brunswick and Maine with keen anxiety. In this province, thanks to the stringent precautions taken by the big companies in co-operation with the Quebec government, outbreaks have not been extensive and have been brought quickly under control before much damage is done. It is also understood that the Quebec government will extend its efforts still further in the direction of air plane services considerably augmented.

INTERVENTION WOULD MEAN WAR

Washington, June 3.—Calling it a "Prussian proposition," Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, declared in a formal statement tonight that war between the United States and Mexico would result from the carrying out of the recommendations made by the senate committee which investigated Mexican affairs. The report, he said amounted to a declaration that unless the government in accord with the ideas of American Oil and Mining interests, the government of the United States will "intervene" in Mexico.

Mexico City, June 3.—A deficit of 2,400,000 pesos exists in the Mexican treasury, according to the newspapers today. They quote General Salvador Alvarado, minister of finance in the cabinet of President de la Huerta, as authority for the statement.

MUST DEVISE MEANS TO PROTECT SALMON

Otherwise Nothing Left to Protect, Says B.C. Commissioner of Fisheries. Vancouver, B.C., June 3.—Ways and means must be devised to protect salmon and halibut fisheries of British Columbia or there will be nothing left to protect, said Hon. Wm. Sloan, commissioner of fisheries for British Columbia, addressing the convention of the Canadian Fisheries Association which has brought into conference more than 100 delegates from various parts of Canada and the United States. Waste, over fishing and lack of proper regulations would prove disastrous to the fishing industry unless remedied. Joint and uniform regulations in regard to Fraser River salmon fisheries in the United States and Canada are necessary, he said.

GERMANY CANNOT PAY

Berlin, May 19.—(By mail.)—Whatever may be the size of the indemnity to be demanded from Germany by the entente, the newspaper Germania says Germany cannot pay it. Taxation, it adds, has already reached its utmost bearable limits, and further burdens would be tantamount to confiscation. The paper asserted there was danger that German delegates to the conference at Spa would be forced to sign undertakings which they knew could not be carried out.
