W. J. MOULE DIES OF RARE AILMENT

Sleeping Sickness Claims the
Assistant Comptroller of
Canadian Pacific.

Montreal, Jan. 25.—The death toll placed early this morning at his home in Montreal West, of W. J. Moulton, who for the past three years was assistant vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, stricken after he has been ill for some three weeks leaves a wife and three daughters to mourn his loss. He was fifty-five years of age and had served over twenty-nine years in the C.P.R. Moulton was an expert statistician and had been one very efficient work especially in the department of the railway's passenger cases which have from time to time been presented before the railway commission.

The late Mr. Moulton first joined the C.P.R. in 1891 as a clerk in the accounting department. He remained for seven years later he was transferred to the general offices, and in 1900 entered the office of the second vice-president and general manager. Shortly after he joined the statistical branch of the accounting department, and in 1901 was assigned to the department of the

years later he became assistant auditor of disbursements. In 1914 he was made auditor of disbursements, and in 1918 Mr. Moule was appointed to the position he held at the time of his death.

The deceased was a son of the late Robert Moule of London, Ont. Mr. Moule died of sleeping sickness.
