Reeve F. H. Miller and other prominent Oakwood residents have left for the north, where they will spend a short time hunting.

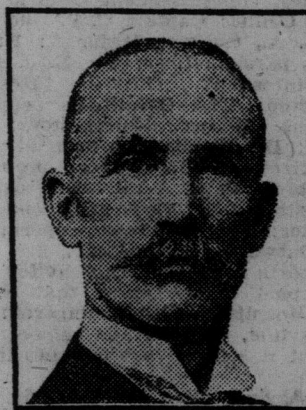
## EAST TORONTO CHURCH NEARING COMPLETION
