

It is understood the Judicature Act, which the provincial government will in-troduce at the coming session of the leg-islature, is now being drafted. It is pro-posed to provide a court of appeal, sitting at Fredericton, to consist of the chief jus-tice and two other judges, while the other judges would go on circuit. Thus no judge would sit on appeal from his own court. It is said the proposition is to have four judges on circuit. In case that is agreed to it will be necessary for the dominion government to appoint another judge, as there are only six now. It is also proposed to abolish magistrates' courts, to increase the jurisdiction of the pointy courts, and to appoint three more county court judges.


