An alarm from box 15 at half past eleven this morning brought the fire apparatus to the house of Mrs. Mary Nelson, at 216 Bevan street, where she had ignited a spot in the roof. Little difficulty was experienced in extinguishing the blaze.

W. W. Gorham, brother of Dr. C. F. Gorham, arrived from Chicago yesterday, having been called as the result of the serious illness of Mrs. Wetmore, wife of major O. W. Wetmore, of Clifton, a sister. This is Mr. Gorham's first visit here in fifteen years.

The tourist season has set in from the United States to the maritime provinces. The steamer Calvin Austin landed 128 passengers from Boston last night and sailed on her return trip this morning. She took away 109 cases fresh salmon for the Boston market.

When the circuit court re-opened this session this morning it was announced that the case of Walsheam's Steamship Co., vs. Phoenix Fire Insurance Co. had been withdrawn from the docket as an amicable settlement had been arranged. The suit was instituted to recover insurance on a burned river steamer. McDonough vs. Telegraph Publishing Co. is the next case on the docket, and following will be Markis vs. McLannan.

Engineer Murdoch is engaged in stopping the leaks in the concrete pipe on No. 2 section of the water extension. A new system of using a small iron pipe drain the leaks and surrounding it with cement. Later on the small pipes will be plugged and the repair will be complete. Seven holes have been discovered in the first hundred yards of pipe uncovered.

A meeting of the harbor board has been called for this evening at 8 o'clock to discuss several matters connected with the dredging to be done below Sand Point. The meeting is being called mainly in view of the fact that Hon. William Pugsley, minister of public works, is expected here tomorrow, and the board desire to have a talk with him regarding the work proposed.

Peter E. Miller, inspector in charge of the U. S. immigration service at St. John, N. B., and Inspector Herbert C. Gillis, of St. Stephen, N. B., passed through the city Monday afternoon en route to St. Johnsbury, Vt., where they are to testify in the trials of the three Chinamen recently apprehended, coming into this country from Canada—Bangor Commercial.

The twenty-fifth annual meeting of the New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society opens here this afternoon in the council chamber of the city hall. Business sessions will occupy the attention of the druggists this afternoon and evening and tomorrow the visiting members will be entertained by the local merchants with a sail on the river to Hampton, and in the evening a banquet will be held in the Union Club.

In view of the pending by-election in St. John county, Premier Hazen has asked the St. John Railway Company to appoint a committee to discuss with the government the matter of running the street cars across the Suspension Bridge. The company has appointed R. B. Emerson and F. E. Sayre, with H. M. Hopper, secretary-treasurer, and W. Z. Earle, general manager, and a meeting will probably be held shortly.

St. Philip's A. M. E. church has just been thoroughly renovated and extensive repairs made. New electric lights have been installed and a new carpet laid the church presents a very neat and cozy appearance. To assist in paying for the improvements and also to give the people an opportunity to see what has been done, a concert will be given on Thursday evening, June 17, to which everyone is cordially invited. The entertainment will take the form of an "Old Folks" concert, with old jubilee melodies and many novel features will be introduced.

George Stanton was bitten yesterday afternoon by a dog that had been injured by a street car or vehicle. Stanton espied the canine on Union street, writing on the ground with a broken leg, and at the request of a little girl, who owned the dog, he picked it up, and after carrying it for some distance, the animal bit him on one of his thumbs, almost severing the member. He dropped the dog immediately and hurried to E. C. Brown's drug store, on the corner of Union and Waterloo streets, where Dr. A. P. Emery cut and sutured the wound to prevent hydrophobia.

GAVE WORTHLESS CHEQUE TO PAY BILL

Calais Merchant Victimized by a Young Man Who Claimed to Have a Bank Account in Fredericton.

William Hawkins a young swindler, who has operated in St. John, Moncton, Fredericton, Bangor, Me., and Miramichi, with his son to Woodland, Me., the pulp centre adjacent to the border town. He selected after much care a suit of clothes and also a dress suit case and various other items. In all the bill amounted to \$86 for which he tendered in payment a check for \$82 signed by H. M. Johnson with whom he said he was associated in construction work on the Atlantic Trunk and Pacific railroad near Fredericton. Mr. Kalish accepted the check and after receiving \$36 which was the difference between the bill and check, he strolled nonchalantly out of the store.

The merchant forwarded the check to the bank at Fredericton on which it was issued and on Monday the check was returned as worthless.
