REDMOND WELCOMED

On His Return From America to Ireland Today. WENT TO DUBLIN. Scenes At An Eviction Near Cork Yesterday Recall the Days of the Land League--Police Violently Resisted.

Queenstown, Oct. 13--John Redmond and his party including J. J. O'Connell, secretary of the United Irish League of America, were given a great reception upon landing from a steamer this morning. In reply to addresses from the League, Mr. Redmond emphasized the immense success of his mission to America. He proceeded to Dublin, where a torch-light procession will be held in his honor. At Webport, near London, Oct. 12--At Webport, near London, an attempt yesterday to arrest a party of six years led to a riot, with the police with fixed bayonets and many on both sides were injured. REFORM IN ARGENTINA. New President Outlines a Progressive Policy of Development.

Buenos Ayres, Oct. 12--Manuel Quintana was today inaugurated as president of the Republic of Argentina. In the presence of officials of the republic and members of the diplomatic corps. In his address President Quintana explained the cabinet's policy and promised amendment of the electoral laws. The question of the prevention of strikes would be given close study, and if the state of the treasury permitted it the foreign debts would be converted. He would also, he said, seek to develop immigration.

THE RUSSIANS HURLED BACK

After Four Days of Desperate And Bloody Battle, Which in Fury Exceeded Even the Carnage at Liao Yang--The Japs in Pursuit of Kuropatkin's Army--A Death Struggle For Supremacy.

Tokio, Oct. 13--1 p. m.--It is reported that the Russians are retreating along the entire front, and that the Russian force at Bentshiu is probably enveloped. Eight more guns have been captured by the Japanese. Mukden, Oct. 13--The battle south of this place continued throughout Wednesday with ever increasing fury. In respect of desperation, bravery, and bloodshed, it far exceeds even the battle of Liao Yang. Towards evening the Japanese repeatedly assumed the offensive. The light continued today with unabated fury and determination. It is now the fourth day of the battle.

A RUSSIAN REPORT. St. Petersburg, Oct. 13--General Salanoff, in a despatch to the general staff, dated October 11, gives some details of the operations of Monday. IN HOT PURSUIT. Tokio, Oct. 13--9.45 a. m.--Field Marshal Oyama, reporting from the field Wednesday afternoon, expresses satisfaction at the progress of the operations and fighting between the Russian and Japanese armies. The center and right armies made substantial gains, while the left army was desperately struggling to envelop the Russian right. Field Marshal Oyama dispatched two telegrams, the first of which said: "The state of affairs in the direction of Mukden is as follows: 'On the morning of Oct. 12th, the central column of the right army at 5 o'clock occupied Lokouin Mountain and the northern heights of Pachessu. The left column of the right army occupied the northern heights of Shotakou and continues to pursue the enemy's central column. The right army succeeded in occupying Mash mountain. The central army, beginning operations on Monday (October 10th), reached the heights extending from Sanchiatzu to Sankanshiu mountain, on the northwest and is probably pursuing the enemy."

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SIFTON IS THE CHOICE.

Chosen As Liberal Candidate in Brandon, Manitoba.

Brandon, Man., Oct. 13--(Special)--Hon. Clifford Sifton, minister of the interior, was unanimously nominated as the Liberal candidate of Brandon, at the Liberal convention held here yesterday afternoon. Mr. Sifton accepted the nomination in a speech in which he briefly referred to the issues of the campaign. The convention adopted resolutions endorsing the Liberal government and expressing unbounded confidence in the minister of the interior.

HALIFAX SENSATION.

Nominations in Upper Canada--Larry Wilson Bets on Conservative Gains in Quebec--Labor Party in Ontario. Ottawa, Ont. Oct. 13--(Special)--Under section 275 of the Railway Act the conditions of carriage made on the different forms of the railway companies have got to be approved, by the railway commission. The board announced its intention to revise the conditions so that there would be uniformity. Pending this revision some of the railway companies were represented before the board today, and asked for an interim order so that their interests might be protected in the meantime.

IN THE LABOR INTEREST.

Berlin, Oct. 13--(Special)--The independent labor party of Berlin, met last night, to nominate candidates, to contest North Waterloo in the coming federal election. The names of Samuel Landers and Dr. J. E. Hett, were placed in nomination. Dr. Hett declined, in favor of Mr. Landers who was therefore made the unanimous choice as standard bearer of the independent labor party.

DELAY IN ALGOMA.

Ottawa, Ont. Oct. 13--(Special)--It is very doubtful if the election in West Algoma will take place on Nov. 3rd. The report received here is that the time is not sufficient to get the necessary work done, and that the date for holding the contest will be postponed. While West Algoma is not in the list of constituencies where voting will take place later than the general election date, there is a clause in the act which will entitle the returning officers to change the date. This was done in Nipissing in 1904.

POWELL'S CAMPAIGN.

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 13--(Special)--H. A. Powell, the conservative candidate in Westmorland, opened his campaign at Moncton last night. The meeting was held in the C. M. B. A. Hall, which was filled. Mr. Powell, a well known farmer, presided. The speakers were Ford Robitoux, editor of the Montclair Free Press, and Mr. Powell. Mr. Powell is being well received. The transcontinental railway is the principal question discussed by him. The conservatives hold a meeting in Moncton tonight.

A WILSON'S DWAGER.
