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

ANNUAL MEETING OF CHARLOTTE STREET CHURCH

A year of successful work was reported at the annual meeting of the Charlotte Street Baptist Church, which was held on Tuesday evening. The church membership of about 400 was increased by nine additions during the year.

During the year the Sunday school had collected \$298.15. A new library had been purchased and a stereopticon was added through the generosity of D. C. Clark. The B. Y. P. U., W. M. S. and mission band had carried on successful work.

The church exceeded its allotment for the denominational budget, the offering being \$491.88. The receipts on current accounts were \$2200; receipts on the building fund amounted to \$2,158.96; other funds \$405.00, which, together with the Sunday school fund made a total of about \$6,000. London, June 14—The casualties in the air raid, it is officially announced, according to the latest police report, numbered 97 killed and 437 wounded. The killed comprise 55 men, 16 women and 26 children. The injured comprise 223 men, 122 women and 94 children.

LORD NORTHLIFFE WILL VISIT CANADA

"Whoever Goes to U. S. in These Times Also Goes to Dominion"—His Mission Outlined

London, June 13—An enquiry made at the Foreign Office by The Mail and Empire correspondent as to whether Lord Northcliffe's mission will take him to Canada, elicited the statement that such an extension of his visit had not been formally arranged, "but you can assume," said this informant, "that whoever goes to the United States in these times goes to Canada also, and Lord Northcliffe with both personal and business interests that have to do with all North America will hardly pass Canada by."

Lord Northcliffe's mission is not to carry on work which was initiated by Hon. Mr. Balfour, but to co-ordinate and co-relate various phases of the work from the business point of view. Already it has been pointed out in The Mail and Empire that America, in the past, has lost some time over enquiries in regard to procedure, but this should now be prevented, as Lord Northcliffe, having seen all the armies in the field, and being thoroughly conversant with government methods and former failings of the British government, is in a position to prevent America from falling into the original British pitfalls.

An American official, occupying a high position, stated privately yesterday that Lord Northcliffe would be persona grat. in the United States, and that his mission should be eminently successful.

RUSSIA WILL RAISE COMPULSORY LOAN

Country Gradually Reverting to Primitive System of Barter

Petrograd, June 13.—The problems of labor and finance loom large. It is announced that conferences are to be initiated by the ministry of finance with a view to raising a compulsory loan. The purchasing power of the rouble has fallen about one-sixth. The hoarding of currency throughout Russia is leading to a gradual reversion to the primitive system of barter.

There are strikes in Moscow and other centres. They are breaking out again in Petrograd. The situation throughout the country bears one common characteristic, a tendency on the part of each district to manage its own affairs. Some parts of Russia are quiet, others are unsettled, and others again perturbed. The work of reconstituting the fabric of the state cannot be expected to be done in a hurry.

FOUR CANADIANS WON THE VICTORIA CROSS

Elgin Farmer's Son Killed Machine Gun Crew Single-Handed

London, June 13.—Five Canadians are included in the list of 30 soldiers awarded the Victoria Cross. Capt. Thain W. Macdonald, a B. A. of Victoria College, enlisted at Ottawa in 1915. With the assistance of two others he captured two machine guns, besides two officers and 75 men, and continued to hold the position for five days, although wounded.

Sergt. Ellis W. Sifton, son of an Elgin farmer, near Wallaceburg, charged a machine gun and single-handedly killed all the crew. He then held off an enemy party advancing down a trench until British troops gained the position. In carrying out this gallant act he was killed after having saved many lives by his conspicuous valor.

Lieut. F. M. Harvey, of Medicine Hat, attached to the Strathcona Horse, ran ahead of his men, jumped into an enemy trench, shot down machine gunners and captured gun.

Pte. Wm. Johnston (427866), of Moose Jaw, killed crew of machine gun with bombs and captured the gun in first German line on line retreating. He again located another machine gun and stalked the second gun as he had done the first, he succeeded in putting second crew out of action and capturing the gun. He was killed shortly after recapturing the second gun.

Major Frederick Lamson, Marine Artillery, brought into the lines under heavy fire, six enemy field guns.
