**TORONTO SHOULD ADD 5,000 HOUSES YEARLY**

I. To Be Enough One-Family Homes When Men Return

Fighting Tenements—Women Must Study Radical Question to Save City From Slums

(Toronto Star) Among all the preparations Toronto is making for the day when our men come back to us, none is more important, and perhaps less thought of than the homes they are to come back to. The army has taken the kink out of their backs, bronzed their cheeks, and given them an incurable thirst for fresh air, and it is the big idea of the medical health department that they shall not come back to tenement houses in Toronto.

Tenement houses, no matter how model, have never been the Utopia at which Toronto is aiming. And the one-family home and garden involves the question of radicals.

"In the next five years," said J. T. Scholes, of the housing division, Public Health department, "Toronto's population will have increased 150,000. It increased by 200,000 in the five years before the war. And with an average of five to a family, it will mean that we will have to provide 30,000 more houses. At the very least 5,000 houses should be erected every year for five years, and unless we can get them overcrowding will be rampant; slums will increase, and the community will pay the penalty."

Seventy-seven in Five Rooms During the past seven years the slum problem in Toronto has been fought as far as the Hindenburg Line of inadequate transportation. When the people turn in and help the health department to conquer that, they will have permanently barred the tenement house from throwing its evil shadow over the childhood of Toronto.

Toronto's fight against slum conditions is trying to be the proverbial stitch in time. It began in earnest in 1912, and at that time this is an instance of the conditions discovered: In a small store and five rooms there were found 77 men sleeping, 25 in one room with space enough for six, lying four in a bed, and the floor space so crowded that the inspectors had to step over the sleeping men to pass. Every door and window was closed.

Fining Scattered Them However, some judicious fining caused the number of lodging houses to increase from 100 to 850, though the war has since reduced this number to 900. The following figures for three years show the result of the work of checking overcrowding: Single houses occupied by three to four families, in 1913, 1,000; in 1914, 1,000; in 1915, 400. Single houses occupied by four to six families, in 1913, 1,000; in 1914, 144, and in 1915, none. Single houses occupied by six to ten families, in 1913, 200; in 1914, 48, and in 1915, none.

Houses unsuitable for housing are rapidly being closed up all over the city; each year the number to be closed growing smaller. Last year 29 were closed, and while the year before there were 79. Still Some Overcrowding While the overcrowding conditions of growing Toronto will be held in check by the health department, there is still another form of overcrowding to be contended with by the health department. That is when Tommy Atkins leaves for the front, Mrs. Tommy is suddenly set adrift—a ship without a rudder. If they take turns—some minding the kiddies while the others go out and have a party—it isn't found to work out for the best interests of all concerned. However, that evil is being steadily combated.

Houses Very Scarce "We don't want the tenement or even apartment idea in Toronto at all," concluded Mr. Scholes. "We have at present only three real tenements in Toronto, and we don't want more. But already houses are extremely scarce and rents are soaring. Labor and material are inaccessible. Transportation facilities it is going to be very difficult to combat the overcrowding and tenement evil."

"If we are to cultivate the one-family home, the working man must have cheap and rapid means of transportation. If not, he will continue to live in the crowded portions of the city." Here is a problem worthy of the consideration of the Toronto women who are wondering how many of the Belgians they want they are going to be able to get with their new votes. It won't be long now until those fresh-air fends in the trenches will be back with us, and each of them should insist on a dugout of his own.

**BELGIAN DAY** On July 21 will be held the national celebrations of Belgium, three years during which the resistance of Belgium has permitted France and England to organize, to prepare the victory. Belgium made the sacrifice by herself! But for her bravery, what numerous things has she been obliged to endure. Thanks to the help of the Allies and to the generous sympathy of the world, she has all surmounted. But the help given by all must not diminish, for the burden is not only sustaining, but always increasing.

July 21 will be Belgian Day. The organizers had the thought to permit to all those who desire to continue their help for the alleviation of the sufferings resulting from the war, which Belgians suffer, to this end, subscription lists are opened in "Pro Belgica," the authorized organ of the Belgian relief committee, to the profit of several works, amongst which donors choose those they desire to patronize.

All these works are recommended by Belgian authorities and all sums collected will be sent to the receiver through M. Goor, consular general of Belgium in Ottawa.

So as to avoid expenses in sending thousands of receipts, they will be sent only on demand. As receipts, subscribers will receive an issue of "Pro Belgica" containing the list of subscription and the amount given.

Furthermore, at the occasion of the Belgian national celebrations, "Pro Belgica" will publish a page illustrated souvenir number which will contain numerous articles and views of Belgium and general information on the
