EXPRESS COMPANIES

ASK RATE INCREASE

Washington, Nov. 19.—Express companies have applied to the Interstate Commerce Commission for an increase of 10 per cent. in their rates. The Adams American, Southern, and Wells Fargo companies, making the application in behalf of themselves and other express companies, set forth that they had suffered a net loss of \$89,846 as the result of increases in operating expenses and taxes during the first six months of this year.

IS A STANDARD OIL

PRESIDENT AND NOT YET 40 YEARS OLD

The Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, the largest oil company in the United States, last week acquired a new president, who has not yet reached his fortieth birthday, in Walter Clark Teagle. Mr. Teagle was chosen to succeed A. C. Bedford, who was elected chairman of the board. Mr. Teagle also succeeds H. M. Tifford as director, the latter having resigned. The change, it is understood, was necessitated by the pressure on Mr. Bedford of his duties as chairman of the petroleum committee of the Council of National Defense, which compelled him to spend most of his time in Washington for the present.

Mr. Teagle was born on May 1, 1875, in Cleveland. His father was a member of the oil firm of Seefeldt, Schurmer & Teagle, his mother was a daughter of Morris B. Clark, the first partner of John D. Rockefeller, and he himself has been in the oil business virtually all his life, most of his career with the Standard.

ANOTHER STEP TOWARDS VICTORY

EQUIPMENTS STRONG

AT MARKET OPENING

New York, Nov. 19.—Wall Street—Equipments, notably those comprising the war division, were the strongest stocks at the opening of today's market. Advances of one to two points soon were registered by American and Baldwin Locomotives, Marine preferred, American Smelting, Industrial Alcohol, United States Steel, Bethlehem Steel, General Electric and the motors were firm to strong, with the leading rails, Delaware and Hudson, rallying two and a quarter points from last Saturday's sharp break. Liberty's recorded a full two per cent discount at the new minimum of 98, the 3 1/2's meanwhile hardening from 99.94 to 99.80.

VERDICT OF \$24,000

FOR SISTER MARY BASIL. Sister Mary Basil, who sued Archbishop Spratt and others for \$29,000 for assault and abduction, was awarded \$24,000 by the jury before Mr. Justice Brydson in Kingston, Ont., on Saturday night. Of this amount the archbishop, the Roman Catholic corporation, Mother General Frances Regis and the Sisters of Charity are to pay \$20,000 and Dr. Daniel Phelan, \$4,000. The other defendants, Policeman Naylor, was assessed nothing.

AMERICAN TROOPS

IN MONTREAL PARADE

FOR VICTORY LOAN

Montreal, Nov. 19.—For the first time in the present generation, if indeed not the first time since the declaration of independence, armed American troops paraded in this city this morning in connection with the Victory Loan procession, and carried "Old Glory" side by side with the Union Jack. The American detachment arrived in Montreal yesterday morning and were given a warm reception by local military men as well as by the C. P. R. officials. The detachment, which is in charge of Lieutenant-Colonel Rhea of the national army, consists of fifty infantrymen of the 805th U. S. Infantry (all drafted men) and musicians, and a naval band of thirty. They had the position of honor in a parade of 10,000 citizens.

PLAIED DYNAMITE UNDER

LORD ATTHOLSTAN'S RESIDENCE;

ADMISSION MADE BY TREMBLAY

Montreal, Nov. 19.—In the dynamiting case, which is still unfinished in the court of King's bench, Joseph Tremblay's evidence was completed on Saturday, when he told of having placed a charge of dynamite under Lord Atholstan's summer residence, when the gang was there for a purpose of destroying Lord Atholstan and his family, in such a way that it would not cause much damage to the house. The alleged confession of Eli Lalumiere, one of the alleged gang of conspirators and dynamiters, was not permitted by the judge to be put in as evidence because it had been made while Lalumiere was in detention in the government building and under a promise by Detective Girard of the Third Detective Agency, that Lalumiere would be released if Monette and Handfield could be secured.
