FINDS P. W. THOMSON'S DOMICILE ROTHESAY

Dismisses Action, However, on Technical Grounds-Hatfield & Co. Win.

Mr. Justice Crocket delivered two judgments of interest in Supreme Court Chambers this morning. In the case of H. C. Page vs. the City of Saint John, judgment was awarded to the plaintiff with costs. This was a suit to recover \$500 paid to the city by the plaintiff as a special tax, for conducting an auction sale in the store of Ferguson & Page. The judge found that, although the auctioneer was brought into the city for the sale, no goods were brought in but that only the stock of Ferguson & Page was sold and that this was the first sale by that firm in 68 years' business. F. R. Taylor, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff, and J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., for the city.
