CITY HALL PAY DAY. CITY DEPARTMENTS WILL HAVE CREDIT. City Council Will Take Up Matter of Estimates Next Week. All of the departments this year will have credit balances, except the lighting which had \$5,000 taken off last year in expectation of hydro reducing the cost of this service.

REV. C. W. FOLLETTE TO OLD COUNTRY

JUDGE REVERSES FORMER VERDICT

New Trial Ordered in Case Regarding Father's Board Bill. In the Supreme Court Chambers this morning Chief Justice H. A. McKeown presiding, judgment was given for the defendant setting aside a former judgment and ordering a new trial in the case of Kenneth Davis against Harvey Nickerson in Queens County on November 10, and on which occasion judgment was delivered for the plaintiff, Davis sued Rice for monies representing reimbursement for board and care of the defendant's father for a considerable time previous to his death. The defendant contended that he had paid Davis this money, when he had sold the house which had belonged to his father, Davis, for a considerable amount less than the property was worth, claiming at the time that the reduction in the value of the property would make up for his late father's board. His Honor this morning ordered costs in favor of the defendant, W. W. Robertson appeared for the defendant and A. N. Carter for the plaintiff.

Mrs. Archie McLean of Elliott Row will leave this evening for Fredericton to attend the funeral of her husband, the late School Inspector William McLean, whose body arrived there today from Vancouver. The funeral will be tomorrow.
