CARL ROSA OPERA CO.
INTO LIQUIDATION;
MAY BE RECONSTRUCTED

London, May 19.—(Canadian Press)—The Carl Rosa Opera Company, against which a creditor recently obtained judgment, has decided to go into voluntary liquidation, but the chairman of the board, foreclosing steps toward reconstruction and the fulfillment of all contracts.

SMELL OF LIQUOR NOT EVIDENCE
Montreal, May 19.—During November, 1920, Emil Bernier was employed as a brakeman on the Grand Trunk Railway. Coming over on a train from St. Lambert, a woman passenger told Superintendent J. J. Connolly that she smelled liquor off Bernier.
Bernier was discharged. He brought suit for \$10,000 for dismissal without

legal justification. Connolly said he had not caused Bernier's dismissal, that he had recommended him for another run.
The court held that "the smell of liquor from a man was no evidence that he had been drinking on duty," which was prohibited by railway rules. In view of the "fact" that he had been dismissed without cause or reason and on the basis of a false report, Bernier was awarded \$2,000 damages.
