

WOULD PUT HOME BREW UNDER BAN

Resolution in Commons by
Hon. W. S. Fielding

Caucus Discusses This and
Civil Service Appointments
—Wheat Board is Discussed
in Commons and More
Estimates Considered.

Ottawa, June 15.—Civil service appointments and the proposal to prohibit home brewing, it is understood, received attention at yesterday's caucus of government supporters. A curious feature of the proposal in regard to home brewing is that it was tabled in the House unopposed by members.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, submitted it along with the other resolutions modifying his budget proposals, but he did not refer to it in his speech. Under the resolution, many persons wishing to brew must take out a brewer's \$50 license will not be issued except to bona fide brewers the restriction, in effect, is a prohibition.

The resolution along with the other budget resolutions, has still to run the gauntlet of committee criticism. It is possible that some change in its provisions will be made.

In Parliament.

Yesterday in the commons a motion for concurrence in the fifth report of the committee on agriculture and colonies, which recommends the passage of legislation creating a wheat board as soon as two or more provinces have conferred upon this agency such powers as are within provincial jurisdiction, was debated at length.

Concurrence was moved by F. Kay, liberal member for Missisquoi, who was chairman of the committee.

Premier King said that if the report brought down a bill to carry out the purpose of the resolution. The bill was already drafted.

Donald Sutherland, Conservative member for South Oxford, moved an amendment calling for establishment of a national wheat marketing agency on a voluntary basis. The amendment was declared lost, and the motion carried without a division.

The bill amending the criminal code was given third reading. Third reading also was given to an act to amend the Supreme Court Act.

Estimates of the department of trade and commerce were considered.

In the Senate discussion of the St. Lawrence waterways continued, Senator Lynch-Staunton, Senator J. D. Reid and Senator Dandurand participating.

BOOM FOR THE ROWING GAME

Sydney Will Have Crews—
The Outlook in Halifax.

The rowing game promises to boom in Halifax and other parts of Nova Scotia during this summer. Halifax, with several prominent and energetic rowing clubs, will be probably the chief centre of sport, but Sydney has commenced operations which promise to plant the sculling pastime firmly in the Steel City.

Fred Hardman, physical director of Sydney, was in Halifax recently and informed The Morning Chronicle that good crews would be racing in Sydney harbor before the summer ended. Mr. Hardman is an enthusiastic oarsman of great experience, and will handle the Sydney crews.

Halifax, with the Northwest Arm, St. Mary's and Jubilee clubs, promises to furnish some fine sport. St. Mary's will hold their regatta on Wednesday, August 16; the "Arm" are going to hold their regatta on Saturday, August 19th; Jubilee have not as yet announced any intention of holding theirs, but it is likely that they will do so. Halifax Carnival week will see a big regatta on the Arm with local crews and a Boston "four" trying for the honors. Sydney will, if present intentions are any criterion, send a crew to Halifax for at least one regatta, but of that Mr. Hardman could not be sure. He thought that it could be done, and is doing his best in that direction.

At any rate the rowing game will flourish in Halifax, and its many lovers in this city will see some great struggles among the oarsmen before the season is over.

St. Mary's Rowing Club has announced that it is their intention to have their own builder, Edmund Petrie, construct any new racing shells that the club might want. In future the oarsmen of the Green Saints will have their shells built in Halifax and have them built to their liking.

This decision was arrived at by the club when the new working boat was inspected. This boat was built at St. Mary's boathouse and has a splendid appearance and the finish of a costly importation. It looks like the best boat of the lot and promises to "swim" well. It is liked so well by oarsmen of Halifax that already several orders have been placed with the builder, and the building of shell racing craft in Halifax seems to have come to stay.

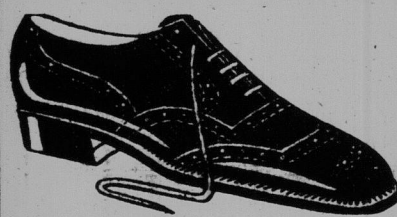
