

The province must first declare for prohibition, then declare against the importation of liquor, which can be done probably in the course of a few months. But if by the majority vote in favor of light wines and beers the present act is repealed, we will be retrograding—going backwards, and the results I would not answer for. Notwithstanding any assertions to the contrary, I know there is less drinking and less drunkenness, and that conditions are infinitely better than in pre-prohibition days. One must remember that under the old law I instructed the police to assist a man if he member that under the old law I instructed the police to assist a man if he were not too drunk, but now anyone showing the slightest indication of having been drinking must or should be brought before me. Even under these conditions the arrests have been fewer. I will vote for prohibition and against light wines and beers, and if my example and influence will but help others, who may at the present moment be wavering, to take a similar stand I will feel that at the age of seventy-seven I will have at the age of seventy-seven I will have accomplished something really worth




