London, Nov. 4.—Sir Thomas James Smith, inspector of the Irish constabulary, has resigned, says a despatch to the Daily Mail from Dublin. His resignation is attributed to "disapproval of undisciplined action and destruction of property by armed forces of the crown, which are now virtually all controlled by the military."
