## PRESS MATTER OF

### DISARMAMENT

London Newspapers Renew  
Call to Nations

### Conference by Great Britain,

United States and Japan  
Urged—Position of League  
of Nations.

London, Dec. 30.—Insistence upon the  
desirability of restricting naval arma-  
ments and the holding of a conference  
on the subject by Great Britain, Japan  
and the United States was renewed to-  
day by London newspapers.

The Times, saying the belief was widely  
prevailing in the United States that  
Great Britain was bound by treaty to  
support Japan in the case that country  
should enter a war with the United  
States, devoted more than half of a long  
editorial, seeking to convince the people  
of the United States that this belief was  
entirely unfounded.

The newspaper recalled that when the  
United States and Great Britain in 1914  
signed
