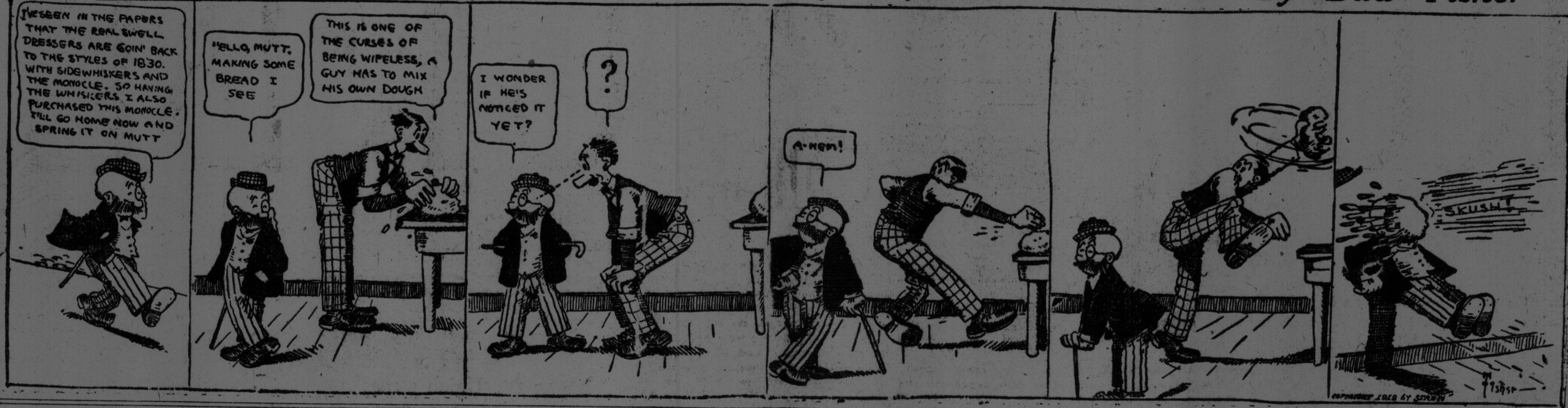

In 1911 the first game between the Athletics and Giants drew the banner crowd, when the receipts ran up to \$77,339. The smallest attendance of the series featured the sixth and last game, when but 20,985 paid admissions were registered at the turnstile for a return of \$38,109.

The receipts of the 1911 world's championship series were the highest of any world's series to date, under the auspices of the National Commission. The total attendance for the six games played was 179,831 and the total receipts were \$427,394.50.

Chicago, Oct. 3.—Manager Fred Clarke of the Pittsburgh National League Club, allowed Cotter, catcher for Chicago, to bat out of his turn in the tenth inning of yesterday's game, without protesting, although Cotter's single won the game for Chicago by the score of 3 to 0.

Last winter Clarke declared that he would not play ball this season. He said that he would not even go to bat in a pinch.

No one took him seriously. All figured that Clarke could not resist the temptation to get into the game. Clarke offered to wager that his name would not figure in a box score all season. From all sides he was flooded with offers to bet that he would play in a game. Clarke took the wagers as fast as they were offered. In a few weeks more Fred will begin to collect his winnings. If all those who bet with him make good, Clarke will be the best dressed manager that baseball ever had.

Abegweits Lose Grandstand
Charlottetown, P.E.I., Oct. 3.—The Abegweits Athletic Association of Charlottetown had a big loss yesterday when the large grandstand at their sporting grounds was destroyed by fire. Owing to the great distance between the grounds and the water tank the firemen were unable to get enough water pressure to fight the flames. It is thought there was incendiary.

Entries or E. D. C. Races.
Although it was announced several days ago that the Every Day Club bicycle race and also the road race would take place this year on October 12, the entries for both events have been coming in very slowly, and so far only one or two entries have been received for each event. The entries for both races will close with a W. W. Coy on October 9, and all those who wish to compete will have to have their entries in before that date.

The Turf
To Check "Doping"
Paris, Oct. 3.—The practice of "doping" race horses, introduced from America, has lately been occupying the attention of authorities as, in spite of a rule forbidding it, there is a suspicion that it is still frequently resorted to. This rule runs—"It is forbidden to administer, or cause to be administered to a horse that is about to race, any stimulant whatever, by any process, with a view to its profits in that race. Stewards may proceed to examine every horse with a view to detecting any infringement of the rule, and may take any necessary measures."

This game race committee full powers, but in practice much difficulty is experienced in discovering fraud. It has often been remarked that runners have passed the post in an unnatural state of foam and sweat, and close observation has detected an exaggerated dilation of the pupil and a superabundant flow of saliva. Such symptoms have naturally aroused the suspicion that the animal has been given strychnine, caffeine, apertine, or some similar alkaloid commonly used in "doping," but proof is difficult to obtain.

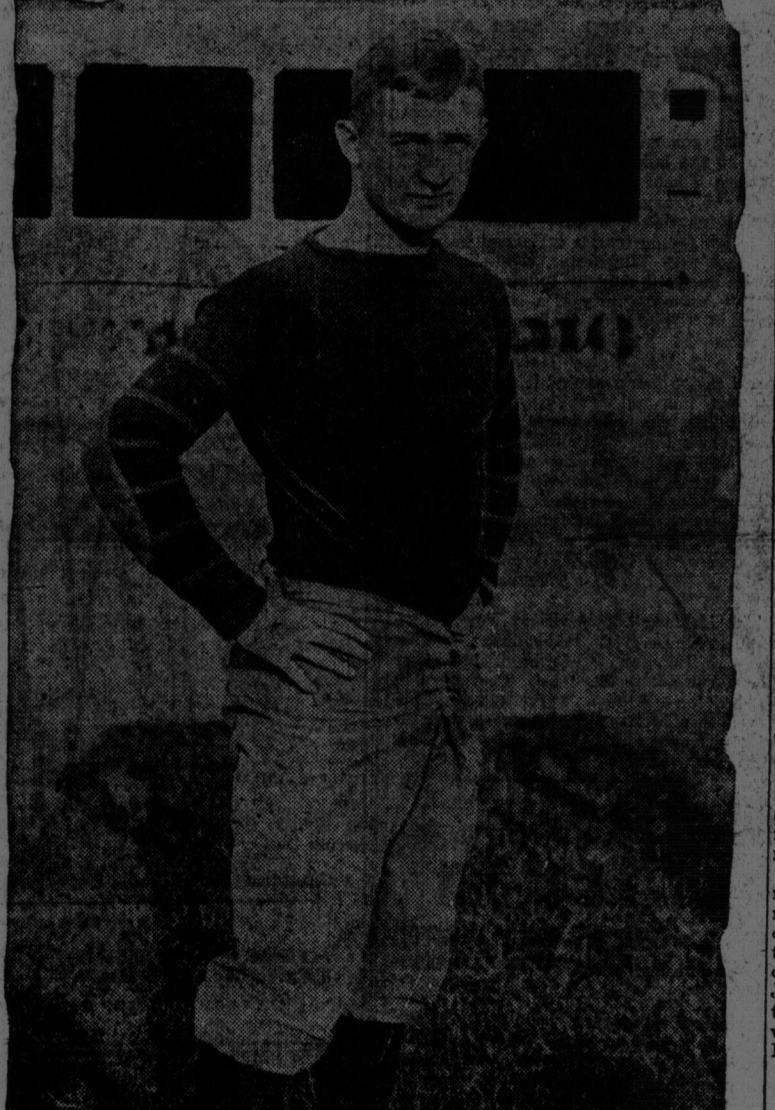
