GOOD FOR ST. ANDREWS. Good words for St. Andrews were given by General Superintendent William Downie, of the C. P. R., who returned from there last night. He announced that the company were to construct a new wharf and warehouse there and that preparations had been made for the opening of the Hotel Algonquin and the smaller one, The Inn, both C. P. R. hostlers. The former will be ready for guests on June 15, and the latter on June 3. Everything was found to be satisfactory. Superintendent Downie said that he had noted much improvement in St. Andrews during the last few years. Through the enterprise of the people they were to have a new sewerage system, and it is expected that a water service will soon be installed to connect with the water supply from Chamcook Lake to the Algonquin. (The probability is that arrangements will be made to have the C. P. R. water from their Chamcook Lake service, as they have ample for their own use.) Mr. Downie says that he considers St. Andrews one of the most beautiful summer resorts on the Atlantic seaboard.
