ASK OFFICIALS TO SMOOTH WAY IN BOND CASE

Otherwise Police Will Send Biddiscombe South for Ronald Humphrey

IMMIGRATION MEN ASKED TO ASSIST

Further News of Action Resulting in Arrest in Rome, Georgia

The aid of both United States and Canadian immigration authorities is being sought by the local police in having Ronald Humphrey of Alexandria street, aged about 23, now held at Rome, Georgia, brought back to Saint John on suspicion of theft of bonds valued at \$4,000 and some cash from Frank E. Jones in 1920 here. The procedure in Humphrey's case has been simplified considerably through his waiving of his right under the extradition law, according to word received here from the Rome authorities last night. Failure to secure the required co-operation of the immigration officials, it is understood, would necessitate the sending of Detective Patrick Biddiscombe to the southern city to bring the young man back here in his nativity.

NOTIFIED BANKS

When the break was made here five years ago and the bonds abstracted from Mr. Jones' safe, the police did not make the news public as they felt they could recover the securities by working quietly on the case. All the banks here were notified of the numbers on the bonds and were asked to keep a lookout for the debentures and notify the police in case they came into their hands. It was only recently that one of the bonds was traced and recovered by the police but not after it had passed through several hands. Just who purchased the bond first after it had been taken from Mr. Jones' safe, the police decline to say.

THE KANE BOND.

As the young man held at Rome is only about 23 or 24 years of age, and as the break took place five years ago, he was still in his teens. Any attempt to sell the bonds would naturally excite enquiries into where it first came from and this is a factor the police say they are not overlooking. The particular bond that was identified and brought to the attention of the police in good faith by George E. Kane from the Royal Securities Corporation and is said to have been traced through several intermediaries before it reached the Royal Securities. The matter of tracing the bond has been engaging the attention of the department. In the meantime, they are not overlooking the lead of the impostor's Victory Loan bonds and the \$1,000 City of Halifax debenture, taken during the break.

Appeal Comes Here From Germany

A late Transatlantic mail brought considerable matter addressed to parties at "St. John, N. B., U. S. A." The circulars were from an institution in Charlottenburg, Germany, and were quaintly worded in broken English carrying an appeal for funds for war orphans of that country. The communication conveyed a vivid impression that orphanage conditions in Germany are in a bad state due to the large increase of dependents brought on by the late strife, and that orphanages were forced to seek aid outside their own country. Obviously the circulars were intended for United States distribution but Canadian mailing lists had evidently become confused with the American. A large halftone engraving depicted over 1,000 of the children assembled in the orphanage. It was indicative of the manner in which Germans carry on Transatlantic appeals that the address of the parties approached in St. John were mostly those of people who had had correspondence with that country prior to the war in matters of trade.
