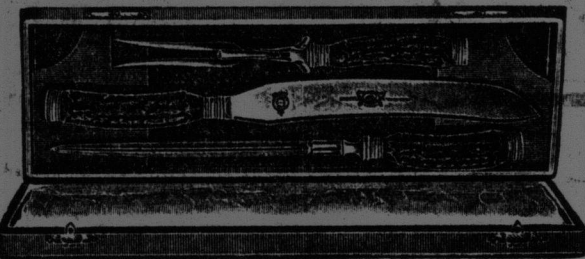

## STUDENTS BUILT IT

Chaplain Huron College Campus Their Own Work

London, Dec. 11.—The fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of Huron College for Anglican theological students, was celebrated yesterday by the dedication of a chapel erected on the college campus. Funds for the purchase of material were collected by the students and under the direction and with the assistance of Rev. Principal and the faculty, the young men built the place themselves without employing outsiders.

## SPENT \$600 ON A TREE

St. Andrew's Beacon—Now that the foliage has gone, a better idea can be had of the piece of tree surgery that was performed on the ancient willow, which guards the southern approach to Fort Upper, in front of St. Thomas Shaughnessy's summer home. This tree is probably one hundred years old, and its stately proportions have been the admiration of visitors for years. Its massive trunk has become so seamed and scarred by age that there was danger of its going into decay. Last season, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy called in tree specialists, and they did a marvelous piece of work on it. The openings in the main trunk were sealed up with cement and other filling, and the great limbs were strengthened with massive chains and iron bars and bolts, cleverly interwoven and braced. The "operation" is said to have cost Sir Thomas \$600, but if it results in the life of this great tree being indefinitely prolonged, it will be money well expended.

## CHAMCOOK PLANT

Lubec Paper Hears Favorable News of Re-Opening

Lubec Herald.—A resident of St. Andrews who is in a position to know what is being said in regard to the big Chamcook plant, told the Herald on Monday that he thought there was little doubt that the factory with its connected industries such as gum and an immense sawing plant, would undoubtedly reopen in the spring of 1914. While not making the direct statement, our correspondent hints that there may be a scheme on foot to freeze out the small stockholders, and put the big plant in the hands of a few men who, after calling vainly on the "little fellows" for more cash to start this up, will then put it up themselves—and there is no doubt that they have it.

Such men as Sir William Van Horne, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy and other men whose names are household words in success in the dominion, are not, says our informant, going to let a little job like getting Chamcook in motion, stop them. They have tunneled too many mountains and conquered too many difficulties—made too many millions—to let a little problem like the Canadian sardine trouble hold them up.

From an unbiased standpoint, it looks probable. The plant with all its accessories, including a refrigerating plant, three hotels, saw mills, and every possible sanitary appliance is on the ground. It is supplied with powerful boats near the wharves and prepared to handle immense quantities of sea foods.

If it does not run it will be the first time that the principal men behind it were ever beaten to a standstill.

## OYSTER CULTURE

Beacon.—Experiments in oyster culture are to be made at Straight Bay, near Lubec, Me. G. W. Ganong made an experiment along this line at Oak Bay, some years ago, but it did not prove a success. Many years ago, Capt. James made a similar experiment at St. Andrews, but without satisfactory result.
