INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENTS. Steady progress is being made in the industrial development of Canada under the new order of things. The London Advertiser has recently given many instances of the confidence which men of money and ability have in the future of the Dominion, and the other day made a further contribution to the list.

The Willson Carbide Works Company has been incorporated at St. Catharines with a capital of \$200,000. In Stratford the Shoe Company has increased its capital from \$3,000 to \$25,000, and will extend its operations.

J. Walshaw, manufacturer of blankets and woollen goods in Bolton, Ont., whose factory was destroyed by fire last summer, informs the Canadian Manufacturer that he is rebuilding on a much larger scale.

The Jordan Willow Beach Harbor Company is being incorporated with a capital stock of \$50,000, to construct and operate a harbor at Twenty-Mile Creek, in the township of Louth, Lincoln county, Ontario, to build docks, buildings, etc.

A large pulp mill will be built by Hamilton & Ayers at Lacoste, Que., a new flax mill has been resolved on.

CANADIAN BUILDING AT BISLEY.

Plans of Montreal Architects Accepted by the D.M.A.—Chances for Canada to Do Business With Scandinavia—Ranger Got Off Lightly—Notes From Canada's Capital.

Ottawa, Jan. 5.—(Special)—The council of the Dominion Rifle Association met to-day to consider the plans for the proposed Canadian building at Bisley, and unanimously selected those submitted by Saxe & Rodden, architects of Montreal. They show the typical Canadian cottage of one and a half storeys in height, of neat appearance, wide verandahs all around, and to be finished in Canadian woods.

Commercial Agent Sontum, at Christiania, Norway, sends a valuable report to the Department of Trade and Commerce. He says that a coal made from peat has been invented, which is proving a most valuable fuel.

Canadian shoes are becoming very popular in Norway. Canadian manufacturers will make a note of this.

The Railway Committee of the Privy Council had a sitting all day, when a large number of applications were disposed of.

A CASE OF SELF-HYPNOTISM.

Frank Dougherty Returns to Life While Funeral Services Were Being Held Over Him.

Newport, Del., Jan. 5.—The extraordinary case of Frank Dougherty, the youth who was supposed to have died last Tuesday night, and who returned to life Friday, while funeral services were being held over him, has given doctors in this vicinity a problem to solve.

The true history of the case is as follows: The boy is 18 years old, and is a student at Delaware College. He is a big boy for his age and is a deep thinker. A company of hypnotists came to the Opera House at Wilmington in October for a few weeks' stay.

The family doctor, who was called in, after a careful examination, pronounced the boy dead, although at the time he could detect a slight heat near the boy's temples.

Dr. Palmer, who is caring for him, reports that he is not yet entirely out of danger. His long and nervous system has so weakened his faculties that he is unable to speak.
