an unusual thing for a member of the opposition. He said he was sorry to hear the report that Mr. Crear was about to resign his position in the cabinet and hoped this was not true as he had been of greatest value to the country as minister of agriculture.

In summing up the conditions of agricultural industry at the present time in Canada, Mr. Crear said that generally speaking, they were good although there was some difficulty in securing a sufficient supply of farm labor.

Mr. Wilson, of Saskatoon, mentioned the splendid work done by Seager Wheeler, of Ross Springs, Sask., and the many prizes he had won for wheat, and suggested that he should be recognized in some way by the department.

Mr. Crear pointed out that there was no precedent for this. He also commended warmly upon the value to the community which Mr. Wheeler had been.

Mr. McMaster thought they might make his farm a demonstration farm.

In the Senate criticism of public expenditures was made by Senator Tarriff when Sir James Loughheed, government leader, put the Senate into committee on the government measures providing \$550,000,000 for demobilization and other purposes.

Senator Tarriff ventured the opinion that unless a halt were called the country would be ruined in reputation of debt or bankruptcy, or heavy expenditures would enable the big interests to assert that there should be no reduction of the tariff, as the treasury had to maintain the tariff to gather its required revenue.

The arrest that prevailed in the country, he said, was largely due to the fact that profits had run into millions in the war. The Minister of finance had said that Canada had made more out of the war than she had spent on the war. That meant that the producers of the country had gathered something more than a billion and a half dollars. It was in the hands of a few, but the payment of the war debt would have to be undertaken by many.

The duration of the Convention is not necessarily restricted to the day herein announced.

Every Local Association in the province is expected to be represented by one or more delegates at the convention of the constituency or constituencies to which it belongs.

In all cases the delegates ought to be appointed by meeting of the Local called for the purpose, and to which all supporters of the "Farmers Platform" have been invited. The basis of representation is the membership of the Local Association in the Central Association.

Any Local which have not reported and remitted membership fees for 1918 should do so at once. If in any quarter it has not been possible to secure a meeting of the Local and supporters of the Platform, the Directors should in any event send one delegate, so that the district will not be unrepresented. Every Local appointing delegates is expected to remit to the Central its contribution to the expense fund before the date of the Convention.

Names of all delegates should be reported to Central well in advance of the date of convention so that delegates' credentials can be returned to the Secretary. Where this is not possible, or where the quorum may not have reached the delegates before leaving for the convention, they will be issued by the Central Officers present on presentation of a letter signed by the Local Secretary stating that the bearer named therein was duly appointed a delegate of the Local. Only duly appointed delegates holding credentials and declaring their support of the Platform will be recognized by the Central Officer in charge of the organization of the Convention. Our Alien Enemies

Recently Mr. Woodworth delivered in the Columbia Theatre, Vancouver, B.C., the following address on "Our Alien Enemies" which appears to cover the question from numerous angles.

The report of this address appeared in the British Columbia Colonist, which is the official organ of the B.C. Labor party, and is, in part, as follows:

"Our Alien Enemies" dealt with in an address by J. S. Woodworth in the Columbia Hall some months ago, was again under consideration by the same speaker at the V.I.E. meeting on Sunday evening in the new quarters at the Columbia Theatre. A request had been made for a repetition of Mr. Woodworth's address, and a large and very attentive crowd was present.

Mr. Woodworth came equipped, as before, with several large charts of statistics, but would not promise to give exactly the same lecture as on the former occasion. He countered the question, "What shall we do with the aliens?" by reversing it: "What are the aliens going to do with us?" The second question was as much "appropos" as the first, appeared from his showing that only about one-half of Canada's present population are of British stock, the remainder being drawn from about 20 different races of foreigners.

Twentieth Nationalities

The second chart showed a picture of the present population of 10,000,000. About one-half of these were occupied by the settlers being of about 25 different nationalities, very few were English, and the majority were Galicians and Ukrainians. The remaining half of the population were vague, being held idle by the C.P.R. and other speculators, including Americans. The speaker observed that the government had done little to get foreign investors to come in and take the natural resources that ought to belong to the people.

By means of another chart, it was shown again how the prairie provinces are, for 1000 miles, set aside by a "general mixture" of peoples. Even a government official located there was surprised to find a Canadian family among them, and declared there were "not many of them kind in this country." Laughter. The speaker held that people who talked about deporting the aliens simply did not know what they were talking about—or else they were simply trying to fool the people. He declared the attempt to set the returned soldiers against the labor men had failed, and the new cry was to get after the foreigners. They should not allow their attention to be distracted in that way. Applause.

"Who is responsible for bringing these people here?" the speaker asked. He had found an agent, and advertising literature, as far away as Milan in Italy, provided for the express purpose of encouraging immigration to this country. Hundreds of thousands of dollars had been spent for this object. These people had come here and played a big part in building up the civilization, constructing railways and opening up the country.

digging sewers and working in the mines, and so forth. They did not get back in wages, anything like what they contributed. There was room for them here. He did not blame the returned soldiers for feeling sore, but the unemployment of the country was not due to the foreigners, but to the fact that the whole system was vicious.

Some said, deport the returned aliens. Well, there were only a few hundred of them, and they were only too anxious to get back home. Others said, those originating from alien enemy countries. This would include the Menominee, who fled from militarism in Prussia 150 years ago. They were doing good work in the country, although many of them spoke the German language. "They are being persecuted, not because they're from Germany, but because they won't fight." Applause. That should they deport Russians? No! They were really too good to Russia as soon as they could. As to other "foreigners" the Italians were our allies; so were the Chinese and Japs, and the Hindus were British subjects. (Laughter and applause.) And with regard to the Doukhobors, no man who had a sense of fairness would let them give their work for years, and then tell them to "Get out!"

Higher Living Standards. Instead of deportation, the speaker suggested that the standard of living be maintained. Let there be no too large and consequent unnatural modes of living. "Then if we cannot hold up our end with the Orientals, the sooner they come into this country and take it the better, for they'll take it sooner or later anyhow."

Ships were sailing from this country to Japan, carrying machinery and iron and steel. What for? To build factories and produce goods to ship over to this country to compete in Canadian markets. "We're going to have cheap competition here or nowhere," the speaker insisted. They must get beyond the narrow view of nationalism. It would have been better, perhaps, he have said to these people, "Come in, and join our unions." At Seattle, though, he said, they had refused to "join." Applause. "When we take that international position, we rise to a higher view of life," the speaker submitted. "We're pretty much the same old world over."

British Foreign Lightbulbs

There were numerous questions from the audience, to which the speaker replied. One asked whether it was the native Canadians who were behind the cry for deportation. Mr. Woodworth said that both the Canadian-born and those born in Great Britain knew very little about the foreigners; they were now beginning to get hysterical. Another inquired if the speaker thought the returned soldier should be made the "goat" of both the labor section and the ruling class, and left without a job. The speaker said, "certainly not." The government was definitely bound to provide for the returned men. It was most reprehensible to allow them to come back and then throw them on the labor market. Dr. Curry asked "If they deported all the Boishewiki and their sympathizers, how many would be left?" The question evoked loud laughter and applause. Mention being made of "foreign agitators," Mr. Woodworth declared that they were, almost every last man of them, from the British Isles. They were seeking to maintain in this country the freedom their forefathers won in the British Isles. This reply also was greeted with hearty applause.
