The gold-bearing rock where it was discovered is a bed of shale, 200 to 300 feet of rock project. ing out of the bank and overhangin the river. Above it is a gravel bed, then three hundred or four hundred feet of rock, and below it another grave bed. The shale is an intermediate deposit. It is located in Big Horse Shoe Bend, in hills forming an escarpment along the river, which come round in a half-circle, almost a mile back from the stream, as though the river at some time had swept right around the base of the hills and gradually worked to its present position, probably depositing the gold bearing shale all the way across the flat, making a territory thousands of acres in extent. Locaters

are at a loss to know how far out the crop extends along the river, but they had no difficulty in finding room large enough to locate seventeen claims, on for every member of the party, and one for each of several Mounted Police officers who were in the neighborhood at the time the discoveries were made.
