TWO VESSELS FROM ST. JOHN NARROWLY ESCAPE DESTRUCTION

BOSTON, Jan. 8.—Two well known vessels from St. John narrowly escaped destruction on the treacherous shoals of Cape Cod during a series of snow squalls today. Barkentine W. W. McLaughlin, bound for New York with lumber, struck bottom off Provincetown while attempting to make that port for shelter. Wood End life saving station sent men to the vessel's assistance, and after an hour's hard work the barkentine was floated and worked into Provincetown. She is not seriously damaged.

The J. Arthur Lord

The schooner J. Arthur Lord, St. John for New London, struck on Stone Horse Shoal at 2 o'clock this morning and pounded heavily. Distress signals were answered by the crew of Monomoy Point life saving station, who saved their lives in a row of three in tumbling seas. It was two hours before the men could board the schooner. Revenue cutter Gresham is sighted and towed the Lord, which was beached in a sinking condition. The crew of the schooner were badly bitten.

Landing Badly

VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Jan. 8.—The identity of the two-masted schooner which, after pounding her way on in dangerous proximity to the burning Stone Horse Shoal, early today, was manned by the crew of the Monomoy Point life saving station and further assisted by the United States revenue cutter Gresham, was learned tonight when the schooner Arthur J.

Lord, St. John, N. B., for New London, was towed here by the Gresham, leaking badly and partly full of water. The crew of the Gresham, in common with the life savers from Monomoy Point, reported a trying trip into this port from the southerly tip of Cape Cod. The crew of the J. Arthur Lord were of but little help to the life savers in the latter's efforts to keep the schooner from sinking through working the pumps, as the men on the battered two-master were numb, stiff and weary after their twelve hours' slog.

The schooner, which was laden with lumber, was coated with ice when she arrived here tonight, and was a dead burden all the way from Monomoy Point. The experiences of the Lord's crew, beginning at 2 o'clock this morning, were such as to render the men incapable of effort after noon today.

The northeast gale, which blew against a strong easterly tide radiated all the efforts of the schooner's crew to set her westward around the end of the cape and several hours after midnight she mis-stayed and was compelled to anchor near Stone Horse Shoal, where she lay pounding the bottom until noon today.

She was sighted shortly after dawn by the crew of the Monomoy Point station, who promptly launched their surf-boat and went out to the schooner. Three efforts prevailed but little, however, and it was necessary to summon the United States revenue cutter Gresham to the scene. The cutter arrived shortly after noon, and it was not long before the J. Arthur Lord was veered around and in tow of the Gresham, proceeding on her way to this port.

REVENUE LARGEST IN CANADA'S HISTORY FOR LAST MONTH OF YEAR

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—The revenue of the Dominion for December, according to receipts entered on the books of the finance department up to the last day of the month, was the largest in the history of the Dominion for the last month of the year, totalling \$7,183,856, an increase of \$9,825 over December of 1907. For a year past the monthly revenue statements have shown regular decreases from record receipts of 1907 and it is hoped that from now on a gradual improvement will be recorded.

Shows Decrease

For the nine months of the present fiscal year the total revenue has been \$68,598,583, a decrease of \$1,457,275 as compared with the corresponding period of 1907. The total expenditure on consolidated fund account was \$50,438,621, an increase of \$4,765,535. Capital expenditure totalled \$28,816,545, of which \$22,969,880 was on public works, railways and canals, construction of the National Transcontinental railway being of course, responsible for most of this. Net public debt on last of December stood, \$291,573,767.

MAGISTRATE MAKES STRANGE DISCOVERY

Story Similar to That Told by Mme. Steinheil Printed in Novel Forty Years Ago.

PARIS, Jan. 8.—M. Andre, the examining magistrate in the Steinheil case, has made an extraordinary discovery. In a novel by Louis Ulbach, called "The Five Fingers of Blouk," and published forty years ago, is the identical story which Mme. Steinheil told to those who tried her and to the police on the morning of May 21, and which she has again declared to be the true story of the crime.

In the novel the bodies of a man and a woman have been discovered, and another woman is found, much to the surprise of the police, on the morning after the murder. "Can you tell us what happened?" she is asked. And she answers almost word for word as Mme. Steinheil answered.

"You can see what happened. Thieves and murderers have killed and stolen. Oh, my dear husband! cries the character in the book with a sob, 'I swear that I will live to punish them. I could not protect you; I will avenge you.'"

"Did you recognize the murderers? Tell us your suspicions. They were three, were they not?"

"Three, yes three, here in the room. I was asleep at 2 in the morning—I

remember hearing the clock strike. I heard the door creak, and a door opened softly. I raised myself in bed, and was going to say, 'Mother, is it you?' when, by the light of the night-light I saw a frightful being. I could not see whether it was a man, for it had a veil, and the face was masked. At first I thought it was a night-mare. "When the apparition came into the middle of the room I saw that the mask was a thick beard. The figure went toward my husband's bed. I tried to spring up, but at that moment I was thrown on to my bed. There were three of them. I could not see them well, but I saw that they had long robes and beards. "I felt two hands round my wrists and two round my feet. The coverlet was thrown over my head, cords were put over the columns of the bed, and I was tied. "If the resemblance of the above story to that of Mme. Steinheil be nothing but a coincidence, it is a remarkable one.

SIX INJURED IN WRECK

NASHUA, N. H., Jan. 8.—Six persons were injured in a collision of passenger trains at Hollis Depot, eight miles south of this city tonight, on the Worcester, Nashua and Portland division of the Boston and Maine Railroad. OUT IN FAVOR OF BOARD OF CONTROL

That the board of control system of civic government is best suited to the needs of St. John was the general feeling expressed at last night's meeting of the reorganization committee. The entire evening was spent in a discussion of a scheme that would place the government of the city in the hands of a small executive, and although it developed that a majority of the committee favored the idea the matter of its application could not be definitely agreed upon.

The recommendation of a city engineer was after considerable discussion laid over until a meeting that has been called for Monday morning next. Aid. Kelley presided at the meeting, which was attended by Ald. Baxter, Frink, Baskin, Rowan, Scully and the common clerk.

In the matter of his worship the mayor to vest the government of the city in the hands of a small executive was taken up and discussed at length. It was stated that there existed an immense amount of work that the aldermen had no business to undertake and which could be handled more expeditiously and to much greater advantage by a small executive competent only to administer the program laid down by the Common Council. Just how this board should be elected was, however, not passed upon.

In the matter of an engineer it was decided to submit a statement defining the duties of the new official at the next meeting of the Common Council and to ask for its ratification by that body.

The actual appointment lies, it is said, between three local men, although Messrs. Blanchard of Toronto and Johnston of Halifax are named prominently for the position and are each supported by some of the following. The recommendation will finally be decided upon at Monday morning's meeting in time for the last session of the Common Council.

The matter of further reorganization will not be reported upon except as to progress made by the committee in its behalf. This is it is thought will open up the matter for discussion and the general expression of opinion resulting from this will no doubt prove a determining factor in the final solution of the committee's problem.

BOARD HOLD OPENING SESSION HERE

The board of arbitration appointed to inquire into the differences existing between the International Railway and the New Brunswick Railway Co. held its opening session yesterday in the law offices of Weldon and McLean, Prince street. The sitting was wholly taken up with the presentation of credentials and the transaction of the preliminary business of the court. An adjournment was taken at five-fifteen until Tuesday morning next, when the inquiry will open in earnest with the taking of evidence.

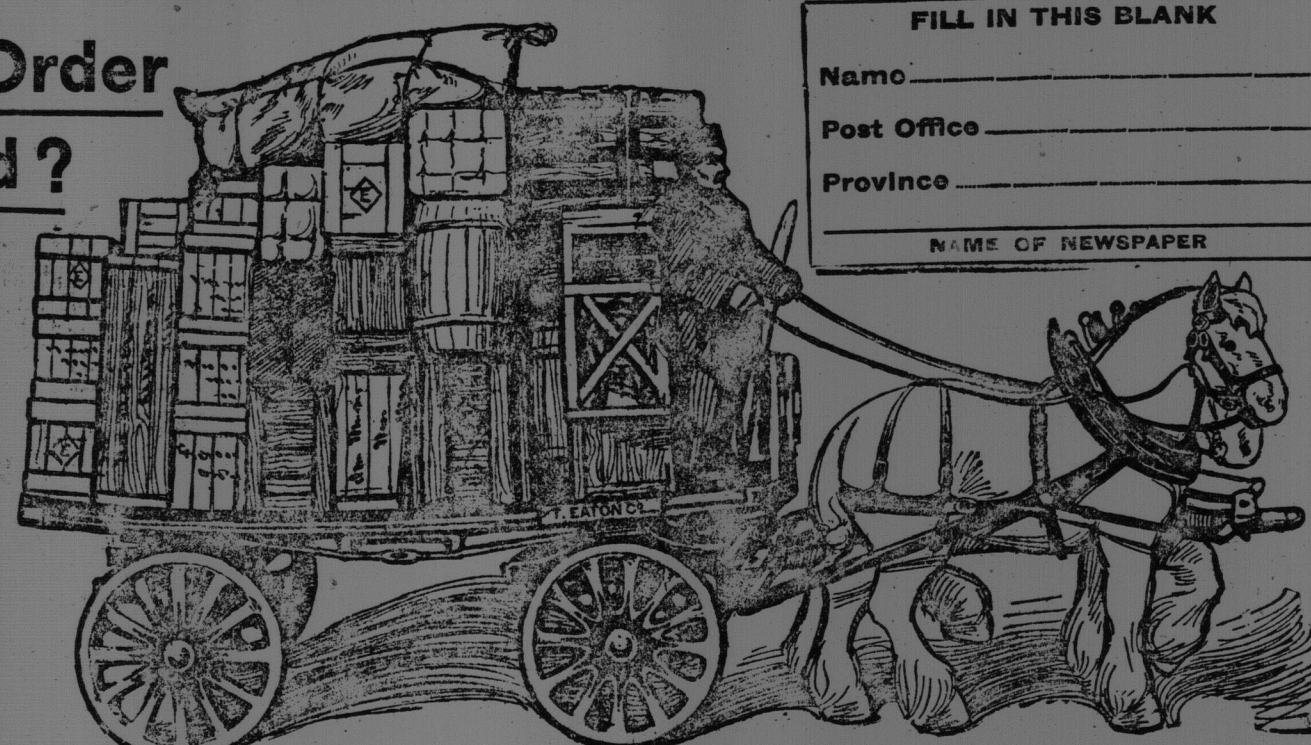

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MABEE FIRES HOT SHOT AT EXPRESS CO.'S

MONTREAL, Jan. 8.—Chairman Mabee, of the Canadian Railway Commission got after the express companies in hot abuse this afternoon at the close of the day's proceedings in connection with the hearing of a protest made by the shippers against a new tariff made by the companies. Chairman Mabee intimated that some time ago the companies had secured his approval of a new tariff by representing to him that it was merely intended to protect the companies against imposition on the part of the public, which, it was alleged was in the habit of shipping goods by freight and returning the empties by express under the free return clause. The evidence presented showed, however, that instead of doing this, the companies had so changed their rules as to greatly increase their charges. His charge was that the companies had misled him. He intimated that he intended abrogating the new tariff but on the request of the companies, he adjourned the hearing until Monday at Ottawa, it being represented that as all the old tariffs had been called in to so suddenly abrogate those now in existence would cause great confusion.

ONE WITNESS IS EXAMINED
