Mr. Perley Gives Notice of a Resolution in the Commons

OTTAWA, Feb. 3.—Levi Peavin, an employe of R. Koch Company, was killed this morning while engaged in unloading logs from a sleigh in the C. P. R. yards. One of the heavy logs rolled on him and death was almost instantaneous.

Mr. Perley (Argentine) has given notice of a resolution in the commons asking parliament to take more active steps in furthering the general movement throughout the country to disseminate information respecting tuberculosis and lessen the great suffering and mortality caused by this disease.

GETS CHOLERA DANCING. Fresh Cases of the Dreaded Disease Reported in Russian Capital.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 3.—There were twenty-nine fresh cholera cases reported in Vladimir street a man was suddenly stricken by the disease and fell to the ground in a well known restaurant a visitor was attacked and a panic ensued. The patient died on the way to hospital.

A girl in a public dancing room was seized by the police while dancing and reeled and fell. Her partner believed her to be intoxicated and left her. She lay for an hour spreading infection. The city administration has voted large sums by night the epidemic.

LIFE-SAVING STATION MAN

FELL WITH PNEUMONIA RISKS LIFE TO SAVE ST. JOHN CREW

was received that a wreck was slightly damaged and took his station in the lifeboat, risking his own life that he might be of service to the shipwrecked sailors.

Later in the morning Capt. Shanklin was rowed to Jonesport and the life savers sent a message to Rockland advising them of the wreck. At 10:45 a. m. the U. S. revenue cutter Androscoegin, cutting 50 miles off shore, received the following message by wireless: "Rockland advises three-masted schooner ashore off Egg Rock. The cutter's log also contains the following entry: 'Egg Rock being fifty miles to the north and east of our position we were for the place at full speed and arrived at the wreck at 2:45 p. m. with two boats manned and ready to render assistance.'"

The Androscoegin is a very powerful ship, fitted with engines of 17,000 horse power. She made several attempts to pull the wreck off, but in this she was not successful and in the storm of last Saturday the schooner was completely broken up.

Captain Shanklin speaks very highly of the treatment he and his crew received at the hands of the life-savers and officers in charge of the revenue cutter. The captain of the Androscoegin stood by with his ship from Thursday until Monday morning.

Capt. Shanklin wishes through The Sun to thank the life-savers for their great kindness toward them and also for the splendid manner in which they stood by for four days in order to render assistance to the unfortunate men. He wishes also to thank the officials of the Eastern Steamship Co. for their kindness in providing free transportation from Eastport to this city, and also for the dinner which they so generously gave.

"You cannot speak too highly of the treatment accorded us," said Capt. Shanklin. "The Androscoegin carries a crew of 75 men and to have these men waiting to do our bidding for four days must have cost the government considerable money. The life-savers also provided us with complete outfits of clothing and furnished us with the best food that could be prepared."

NURSE POISONS HER MOTHER OF NINETY, THEN ENDS HER OWN LIFE

Preferred God's Judgment to Man's, She Wrote—Daughter Wouldn't Trust Care of Parent to Others, and She Was Tired.

BALTIMORE, Feb. 2.—As a result of taking fifteen grains of bichloride of mercury with suicidal intent after she had made an attempt to kill her mother, 85 years old, Miss Amanda Yearwood, 58, a trained nurse, is dead at the Johns Hopkins Hospital. The attempt to kill Mrs. Yearwood was made at the Home of Incurables, where she had lived for some time. She is suffering from softening of the brain, and, at times, acts like a child.

Miss Yearwood's reason for wanting to end her life was that she was tired of struggling for an existence in broken health, and her desire to slay her mother was prompted by the thought that she did not care to leave behind the only woman for whom she had cared for years.

Notwithstanding the fact that Miss Yearwood gave her mother a strong hypodermic injection of morphine, it had no effect, except to put her into a stupor.

Then Miss Yearwood, finding that her mother had not died and that her own system loaded with poisonous mercury, begged the physicians to save her life, but it was too late.

Being a nurse, the authorities at the home had permitted Miss Yearwood to sleep in the same room with her mother, and the daughter injected the poison into her parent's system during the night.

It is certain was Miss Yearwood that the morphine would kill her mother that she wrote several letters, in which she told of her acts, and directed the disposal of her effects, believing at the time that when they were read both she and her mother would be dead. One directed to Crozer Caruthers read:

"This is Mr. Crozer, a case of matricide and suicide. My mother is very old and can never be well again, and I am worn out with nursing her for eight weeks. Her nurse had shamefully neglected her, and because I stayed with her and nursed her, I was charged with the care of her. I got the hatred of two nurses and the matron, who reported me to the resident physician at the home.
