Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appoar in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon

good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside mis homestead.

Price \$3.00 per acre. Buties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead retent) and cultivate fifty acres

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Dutius.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house transfer \$200.00.


WEYMOUTH FIRE OF INCENDIARY ORIGIN Quantity of Bedding Placed
