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ROUGHING IT DOWN THE ALLEGASH

Suggested By Honeycombers

When Mr. and Mrs. Rufus G. Jasper of Lewiston stepped into their automobile for their honeymoon trip just a few weeks ago, they did so with a purpose. This doesn't mean that a wedding trip was not usual, but the sort of a trip which they undertook was a trip they didn't head for Niagara, where the rumble of the falls covers the sound of impulsive snatches. Neither did they make for Boston, New York and their bright lights, nor to the seashore. Their objective was the great outdoors, the big woods and the delightful waterways of Northern Maine. They set forth upon a wedding trip which called for roughing it, adventure, and the opportunity to commune with nature.

The first objective was Greenville, that attractive little town at the foot of Maine's great inland sea, Moosehead Lake. Awaiting them there were two persons, William Cyr and Madawaska, whom every one calls "Bill" after the first introduction, and J. Fred Sawyer of Greenville. Bill is a college friend and a fraternity brother of Mr. Jasper. His purpose in being at Greenville was to meet Mr. and Mrs. Jasper, to see that they were properly started on the trip up the lake, and then to drive their car across country to Madawaska accompanied by the Misses Bouchard and Florine Dufour. Mr. Sawyer was waiting to take them up the lake in his speed boat, the fastest water craft on Moosehead Lake.

"It was a thrill every minute going up the 40 miles from Greenville to Northeast Carry in Sawyer's boat," said Mrs. Jasper as she told the NEWS REPORTER on their arrival. How that boat can go, and what a wonderful sail it is up the lake! Mountains, islands, bays, coves, fishermen, canoeing and boat parties. Oh, it was just glorious and how I enjoyed every moment of it!"

FIRST CAMP

At Northeast Carry the young folks got the first taste of what was ahead of them as they struck the big woods from which they were not to emerge until they had traveled many, many miles down rivers and streams and across lakes and ponds, had experienced adventures, had met many interesting people, and finally had arrived at the junction of the Allegash and the St. John about 40 miles above Fort Kent. All in all about 210 miles of canoeing, lake side of the narrowest point of the divide between the Kennebec and Penobscot river waters. It was from there that one makes a start either for the Allegash or the West Branch canoe trips. In the old days one walked across from the lake to the West Branch, following a rough road, while canoe and baggage were transported on a rickety old car running on wooden rails and drawn by a horse. All that has gone, explains Mrs. Jasper.

They lost no time after reaching the shores of the W. B. In loading their stuff into the canoe and starting on the big adventure. When they reached the Big Island it was time to make their camping arrangements for the night. It was their first camp on the trip and Mrs. Jasper's first experience under canvas, her husband had camped previously.

EXCITING MINUTES

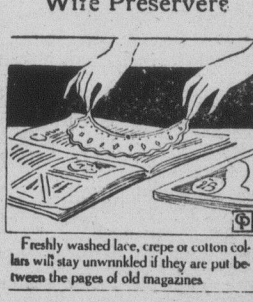
