Dominion's Royal Commission sails for Canada July 17—Spend week in Newfoundland before coming to Maritime Provinces.

London, July 6.—The Dominion's Royal Commission, having concluded the hearing of evidence, paid a visit of inspection to the Port of London on Friday, taking special note of the storage accommodation at the Surrey Commercial docks for Canadian cheese. E. R. Bowering, the Newfoundland commissioner, has already sailed, while the majority of the members sail by the Alaskan on July 17. At Rimouski they will leave the liner and be met by Sir George Foster. From Rimouski they will sail by the Earl Grey for Newfoundland. After a week spent at St. John's, they will cross to Sydney, N. S. They will sit as follows:—Halifax, August 5; St. John, August 11; Charlottetown, August 17; Quebec, August 20 to 22; Montreal, August 24 to 26; Ottawa, August 29 and 30, and Toronto early in September. The commissioners will travel westward via the Great Lakes and Winnipeg, concluding their sittings in Vancouver about October 10. Ocean freight, shipping and harbor facilities and cable, and postal communication will form the chief matters of consideration. Every effort will be made to prepare another interim report before their departure.

REPRESENT CANADA  
AT DENTAL CONGRESS

Ottawa, July 5.—The government has appointed three doctors of dental surgery to represent Canada at the Sixth International Dental Congress to be held in London, England, next month. The Canadian representatives are: Dr. Andrew J. McDonough, of Toronto; Dr. Eudora Debeaux, of Montreal; and Dr. G. F. Bush of Winnipeg.

TURKISH WARSHIP  
FIRES ON GREEK VESSEL

Athens, July 4.—The Athens papers publish despatches from Chios, an island in the Aegean, that a Turkish destroyer on July 3rd bombarded and captured a Greek trading ship, but which was transporting refugees to Chios. The same destroyer proceeded to Goulet and bombarded and destroyed a monitor.

The police of Schenectady, N. Y., are still puzzled over the finding of a female torso, taken from the Mohawk River near Schenectady. The only clue so far is the finding of a piece of lace, presumably from the bottom of the victim's skirt, and an odd piece of oilcloth. Claude Hanlon, a boatman, has given the authorities a new clue. He told the police of a strange Italian of disheveled appearance who was seen on the bank of the Mohawk near Shear's Quarry, a mile below the spot where the girl's torso was found.

PROFANITY IN  
PUBLIC LIFE ON  
THE INCREASE

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 5.—The annual meeting of the Island Baptist Association closed tonight with a sermon preached by Rev. Dr. Cutten, president of the Acadia University. One of the most interesting reports submitted on Saturday was that on temperance and moral reform. It stated that profanity, open and brazen, seemed to hold sway largely in public life. The churches were strongly urged to lose no opportunity to show their disapproval of the abominable practice. If the profane cannot be reformed their society should be abandoned. The tendency of the times is to degrade the Lord's day into a simple holiday. The practice of using profanity for society visiting should be strongly condemned. No Baptist church is now looked upon as orthodox which tolerates as members persons who are not total abstainers. Total prohibition of liquor traffic is the great good towards which the church is working, and all church members should present a united front when the time for voting comes. The prejudice against mixing religion with politics has been taken advantage of by low class politicians who seek to rule the government. Politics therefore should not be accepted from the pulpit as a means of winning the struggle for the past two months and the investigation which is now being held into the charges made by the alliance.

KING GEORGE'S WEDDING ANNIVERSARY.  
King George V. and Queen Mary will celebrate the twenty-first anniversary of their marriage, as it was on July 6, 1893, that Princess Victoria Mary of Teck became the bride of the future monarch. The present King is the first of the five Georges to achieve domestic happiness, for every one of his predecessors of that ill-fated name were involved in love affairs that were sometimes tragic and often scandalous. In temperance George V. and Mary are very much alike. Both are domestic in their tastes, and devoted to a quiet home life. Both dislike gambling, to which three of the four earlier Georges were passionately devoted. Queen Mary was engaged to marry the Duke of Clarence, George's elder brother, but that Prince died suddenly in 1829, and George, who thus became heir presumptive to the throne, sought and won the hand of "Princess May."
