FREDERICTON

Fredricton, N. B., Aug. 30—A test of the water system of the city was made here this evening under direction of Peter Clineh, secretary of the New Brunswick Board of Underwriters; Edgar H. Fairweather, of St. John, and J. W. E. Coffan, of Hartford (Conn.).

The insurance men admitted the results of the test exceeded their expectations. The test was made between 6 and 7 p. m. with nine streams turned on from hydrants near to each other, and a pressure of forty-five pounds at the central hydrant was obtained. The ordinary pressure when no streams were turned on was eighty-four pounds. At the same hydrant the pressure at the nozzle after the water had passed through 450 feet hose, and eight other streams were on, was thirteen pounds.

City Engineer Feeney states that fifty per cent. more streams could have been turned on without materially affecting the pressure.

Mr. Clineh, after the test, admitted that better results were obtained from the pumps than when the last test was made by him two years ago. The citizens are generally of the opinion that there is no reason for an increase in fire insurance rates.

The Provincial Normal School will open on Thursday with the largest attendance in the history of the institution for the opening of a new year's work.

Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, the principal, announces that 311 applications for admis-

sion to the institution at the opening of the next year's work on Thursday have been accepted, the number being fourteen larger than last year when the total attendance at the opening of the year was 287.

In addition there will be the French department scholars, bringing the total up to almost 325.

Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 31—No extension of time has been made with regard to the Grand Falls Power Company's rights. The extension granted to Sept. 1 was more than asked, which was only to the middle of August. It is believed here that an understanding has been reached by the two companies.

The funeral of the late Dr. H. V. Creed will take place from Brunswick street United Baptist church Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

John Bartlett and Thomas Carle, of St. Marys, have caught what is believed to be a record sturgeon for the St. John river. The fish was about eight feet six inches long, weighed 350 pounds, the head alone weighing 37-12 pounds. The fish was caught between Oratory Island and the mainland and has been sent to the Boston market.

Dr. H. S. Creed passed away at 2 o'clock this afternoon. He was a native of Halifax and was aged sixty-eight.

Dr. Herbert C. Creed was for thirty years instructor of English literature in the Normal School. He attended the recent maritime Baptist convention in Woodstock and was appointed to the office of secretary. Upon his return home he complained of feeling ill and on Monday he was stricken down with hemorrhage of the brain.

Dr. Creed was a native of Halifax, a graduate of Acadia College, and was a member of the Normal School teaching staff for more than thirty years, retiring last September on a pension.

Previous to his coming to Fredericton he taught school in Nova Scotia. He has long been recognized as one of the most prominent Baptist laymen in the maritime provinces.

He served as moderator of Acadia College and for years superintended the publication of the Baptist Year Book. He was clerk of the Brunswick street Baptist church for many years and upon retiring from office was appointed deacon. His friends all over the maritime provinces will regret to learn of his critical illness.
