Better Terms.

A few days ago, Hon. Mr. Mackenzie,

leader of the Reform Party in Parliament,

in a speech delivered in Gloucester

referred in the following terms to the

policy of increasing the money indemnity

to the Lower Provinces.

The Imperial Act provided that a certain

annual sum should be paid to each

Province. Nova Scotia complained that

she did not get enough. The Opposition

said, "Then let us have an inquiry either

by commission or by committee of the

House, and if the terms are found unjust

we will apply to the Imperial Parliament,

if the Province are willing, for a modification

of the terms." But, no; the Government,

after declaring that Nova Scotia

had received all that was entitled to, turned

round and, in order to buy up Mr. Howe

and Mr. Mellish, agreed to give Nova

Scotia some \$80,000 a year additional

aid, without any reference to the Imperial

authority. Look at the danger of this

Condition of the Grand Trunk Railway.

Mr. Byrdge, of the Grand Trunk Railway,

before the Coroner's Jury which has been

engaged into the cause of the Shanaville

accident, referred to what has been,

and is being done to make this railway

in all respects equal to any one on the

continent. Mr. Byrdge said "the whole

line between Montreal and Toronto has

been entirely renewed within the past five

years; in 1867, 614 miles of new track

were laid; in 1868, 511; in 1869, 604; in

70, 69 miles, of which 324 were steel, and

in 1871, 874 miles, of which 44 were steel;

that is a total of 339 miles, or six miles

more than the distance between Montreal

and Toronto; the original number of ties

laid between Montreal and Toronto was

707,500; in five years—1867 to 1871—750,000

ties were put into the track, and in

five years—from 1867 to 1871—there were

put in 670,000 ties, so that the whole of

the line between Montreal and Toronto has

been renewed within twelve years. As regards

ballasting there is always more than

enough to keep up Mr. Byrdge's
