Tariff Delegation Hurling the Mi-

OTTAWA, April 21.

The delegation held upon the Finance

Minister continued, and it is generally

admitted that the tariff cannot be carried

through the House as it stands. It is

said that the Government have consented

to remove the sugar duties, and offer to

compromise the duty on ship materials by

making it two and a half per cent. There

are seven delegations now surrounding

the Finance Minister. The last one ar-

rived from Montreal this morning to in-

sist upon twenty per cent duty on all

manufactured articles. These delegations

are principally composed of ministerial

supporters.
