Several months of the year we have been entirely without money in the treasury, and our R. W. G. S. has been compelled to use his own private funds and credit to meet the current expenses of the Order. We need greatly a missionary fund, and I trust that some plan will be inaugurated this session which will secure sufficient funds for missionary purposes. I am afraid we have thousands of members who do not appreciate our order because of its cheapness. Let us remember that our duty is to give according to our ability. If no better plan can be arranged for the procurement of a missionary fund, I would suggest that the plan of placing boxes in our ambordinate Lodges be considered; their contents to be reported through the Secretaries and Grand Secretaries to the R. W. G. S. at the end of each month or quarter; and that a correct list of all Lodges and amounts be kept by the R. W. G. S. Also, that this body appoint one night in the year on which all subordinate Lodges be requested to hold a public missionary meeting, and the proceeds to be immediately forwarded through the G. W. S. to the R. W. G. S. If each subordinate Lodge would hold a meeting of this kind annually, and no more than need collar was collected at each meeting, it would give us more than ten thousand dollars for missionary work. I implore you to adopt some plan by which this fund may be raised.
