Monday, July 2nd, has been proclaimed in the Ontario Gazette as a public holiday.

Tribary public school is advertising for a woman principal for their school at \$1,000 salary.

Mrs. Everett, eldest daughter of James E. Graham of Dutton, died at Vonda, Sask., last week.

HARRY Brock, townline Melville and Carleton, had three valuable milk cows killed by lightning.

Twelve business men of Dresden have been summoned for breaking the early closing by-law of that town.

A farmer near Dresden attached a set of harrows to his auto and harrowed three acres in about twenty minutes.

Mrs. Thomas Henry, formerly of Alvinston, died in California. The remains were cremated and the ashes interred in Alvinston cemetery last week.

Lieut.-Col. Bart Robson, late commander and organizer of the 15th Battalion, has been nominated for the Legislature by the East Middlesex Liberals.

The village of Dutton will purchase a 25-horsepower gasoline fire engine from Hugh Carmichael of West Lorne at \$1,250, the money to be raised by debentures.

Signaller Harold Ketch, formerly of Alvinston, has been promoted to Lance Corporal and has been awarded the Military Medal as well as a good conduct stripe.

Melbourne Kelly, who gave up a drug business at West Lorne in order to enlist, is now a prisoner of war at Lindenberg, Germany. He was reported missing about a month ago.

The late William Milner, who died at West Lorne recently, had been a member of the Anglican church for 55 years and during that time missed only five Sundays from attending church.

The annual camp meeting of the Sarnia District of the West Ontario Conference of the Free Methodist Church will be held June 27 to July 1 in James Milton's grove, two miles southeast of Middlesex.

At the manse, Cowal, on June 2nd, Daniel Crawford, manager of the Home Bank at Lawrence Station, and Miss Emma Lawrence, daughter of James Lawrence of the same place, were united in marriage.

At the annual county convention of the W. C. T. U. held in Strathroy last week Mrs. J. J. Jones of London was elected president. Mrs. H. H. Munro, Newbury secretary and Mrs. S. Fennell of Newbury treasurer.

At the suit between Ford Motor Co. and Dodge Motor Co. at Detroit, it was proved that the actual net profit on Ford cars was \$1.19 each, but the enormous production, 600,000 cars this year, made a nice pile of money for the stockholders.

W. R. Davies of the Thamesville Herald was honoured by the Canadian Press Association at its annual meeting by being elected president of the Ontario and Quebec section of the association, and vice-president of the general association for these two provinces, also a member of the advertising committee.

Stunned by the force of the bolt, which ripped a shoe from her foot, Mrs. H. F. Hudson, teacher of Collins school, con. 1, Canada, escaped death by a miracle when the building was struck by lightning. The bolt hit the chimney of the school and ran down it to the stove. Mrs. Hudson was knocked down and the blackboard ripped up.

Knitting is to be taught in the Windsor public schools. In view of the urgent need of socks for soldiers at the front, the principals of the schools, in a meeting held in the evening, decided that it would be well to have the girl pupils take up the art of knitting instead of sewing, while the war is on at least.

John Denning, Brooke township, was awarded \$250 and costs in the county court in an action brought by him against Middlesex county to recover \$250, because of an accident in Adelaide township in August last, when his automobile overturned on a section of newly repaired highway. He sued for damages, claiming that the county was responsible for leaving the roadway in that condition.

In accordance with the Ontario Temperance Act, as amended at the last session, every railway, express company and other common carrier is required to keep at each agency within the province where goods are consigned to an accurate record of each consignment of liquor received and every consignment of liquor made, so that the Ontario License Board may keep track of sales. The result has been amazing, and the list of shipments of liquor from outside to the Province of Ontario is formidable.

"It is quite beyond anything we anticipated," remarked a member of the board.

Replying to a request that steps be taken by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission to supply power to Alvinston, the chief engineer has written to the municipal council, stating that on account of the distance of the village from existing lines, and also on account of the small load which would be obtained in proportion to the amount of line that would have to be built, they have as yet been unable to work out a scheme to supply the village with power at a rate that would be low enough to warrant its use by consumers. They were now working on a new proposition, however, which they hope will have satisfactory results.

Glencoe Horse Show.

All circumstances considered, the Glencoe annual horse show and races, held Wednesday of last week, may be said to have been a splendid success. Having to be postponed and brought on in one of the busiest seasons in the year for the farmer mitigated against the attendance to no small degree, yet the gate receipts were in the neighborhood of \$300, only slightly less than last year's receipts from this source.

The various classes in the exhibition field were for the most part well filled, and the entries for the trotting events exceeded in number those of most previous seasons, there being six horses entered for the free-for-all and eight for the 2:50 event.

Entries came from far and near, and the class of animals exhibited was uniformly good.

Enjoyment of the afternoon was enhanced by a program of music rendered by the Wardsville reed and brass band and selections by Piper George Brackley of Wyoming, also Scottish dancing by the little Misses McLean of London.

A couple of unexpected thrills were staged. The first was when one of Hector McKellar's team of four chunks reared and got one of its feet over the buggy pole, snapping it off. A serious runaway through the crowd was only averted by J. D. McKellar grasping the horse by the bridle, and with the assistance of some of the bystanders and at considerable danger and difficulty bringing the team under control again.

The other thrill occurred in the first heat of the free-for-all, when two sulkeys came together near the quarter pole, with the eight horses entered pretty well lunched. Barnwood, owned and driven by J. M. Young of Sarnia, turned a complete somersault, but both horse and driver escaped with a few bruises. Mollie Mac, the other horse in the mix-up, escaped unhurt, as did also its driver. Both sulkeys were badly damaged.

The track was in splendid shape, and both races were contested very freely, resulting as follows:

Thrilling Farm Accident.

William J. Eddie of Ekfrid had a most miraculous escape from serious injury and perhaps death itself on Thursday while working with three horses and a 12-foot harrow on the farm of his father, Hugh A. Eddie, near Glencoe. Surveys were engaged, making an examination of the Eddie drain running through the farm, and the sun's rays reflecting from their instruments frightened the horses into running away. The young man had left the horses standing and at that time was about four rods away. He ran to their heads to stop them and was thrown off his feet, horses and harrow passing over him, the harrow rolling him over and over several times, but fortunately the teeth did not catch his clothing and drag him. The only injuries he sustained were bruises and cuts on the limbs and a cut beneath one eye, which the doctor is caring for. A day or two after the accident he said he was just beginning to feel where the teeth of the harrow had prodded him in the body but failed to penetrate.
