SHOOTING RELIGION INTO
TOWN WHICH OUSTED
PREACHER

The strenuous methods of the late
Colonel Roosevelt in achieving re-
forms are recalled in "Hell Roarin'
Reform," a William Fox screen
production having Tom Mix as its
star, which is to be presented at the
Star Theatre for 3 days beginning
Monday. The play deals with the
evil spirits of Tarantula, a hand-
ridden town whose outlaw residents,
oust the preacher—and it is Mix's
task to shoot religion and right-
eousness into the place. The Fox cov-
boy star is said to do this with his
customary dash, tackling the job with
the same degree of directness that
Roosevelt used in tackling trust
malefactors, mollycoddles and undesir-
ables.

Numberless new thrills are prom-
ised in "Hell Roarin' Reform" which is de-
clared to be the liveliest western
drama in which Mix has appeared.
Among other things Mix leaps on
horseback from the upper balcony of
one building to the roof of another,
plunging through the roof with his
horse; he rides down a steep moun-

three guns at one time, and shoots a
pipe out of a man's mouth.

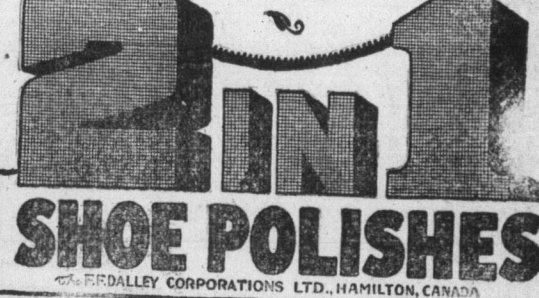

NEW BRITISH INDUSTRIES.

\$30,000,000 For Vast Schemes
South Wales.

Swansea.—Vast industrial devel-
opment schemes, entailing an ex-
penditure of \$30,000,000, and introduc-
ing new industries to the South Wal-
district, are being undertaken. The
largest is that of the Anglo-Persian
Oil Company, who will pump oil from
tank steamers into large storage
tanks, whence it will travel by pip-
elines to the refineries at Skewen.
Baldwin's are making rapid strides
in the specialized treatment of oil
(which used practically to be in Ger-
man hands), and are about to ere-
blast furnaces. Borings for coal are
being made, and dye works are ere-
cted.

Plans to develop the mineral re-
sources of the agricultural resources of the Gov-
ernment, which stretches nine miles
from Swansea and has valuable
limestone and coal deposits, are read-
ily made. The Graigola Patent Fuel Com-
pany's works. Extensions are taking place
at other patent fuel works, and
steel, tin-plate and spelter work.
At Landore new works have been
erected to deal with zinc extraction
and the promoters' efforts have been
crowned with success. This was
another process from Germany. The
making and the manufacture of the
higher grades of steel are to be among
Swansea's new industries.
