WATERLOO MFG CO.

This historic name is as familiar to the thrasher as the historian. The manager of the provincial branch here is Geo. Hinchley. Their outfit at the fair was a 25 h.p. simple traction engine with steel gear. The separator is a Manitoba Champion fitted with a Waterloo gearless windstacker, and Hawkeye feeder, perfecting weight. The rig is equipped with tank and trucks.

AMERICAN TRUCKS

Among the pioneer companies in the Canadian west is the American. The outfit at the exhibition was composed of a 26 h.p. steel gear general purpose engine. The separator was a 32-56, new 1907 model, complete in every way. The manager of this company for Alberta and Saskatchewan is Aid. L. T. McDonald of this city.

WATERLOO ENGINE WORKS

This well-known make of engine was hatched to an Emerson combined disc and moulboard plow, ranging from fourteen to twenty-eight discs, with seven discs to a section. This plow cuts from 15 to 29 feet, and for lightness of draft it is claimed it cannot be excelled. Another engine 26 h.p. was attached to a 36-60 separator the whole outfit being complete for shock or stack threshing. R. E. Mickleborough is the Regina manager and Chas. de Forge travelling salesman.

GAAR-SCOTT

Among the leading concerns doing business out of this city as their provincial headquarters is the Gaar-Scott Company, having an extensive warehouse on Smith street. Their threshing machines are very well known in this country. They had two engines at the fair, one a double and a single 25. The separator is a 40-64 with all modern attachments. Their extension feeder was the only one on the grounds. The manager for Saskatchewan is F. C. Renebohn of this city.

INTERNATIONAL HARVESTER COMPANY

The exhibit of this company only represented one of the extensive business which is conducted under the able management of W. P. Wells of this city, where the provincial head office is established, and where a large staff of clerks is employed. This company is now erecting a handsome office and warehouse block which when completed will rank with any in the city.

The company manufacture their own gasoline engines two of which were at the exhibition last week. The 20 h.p. portable was belted to a 32 in. separator. This was one of the nearest attractions on the grounds. The cleaner was complete in every particular and will thresh from seven hundred to a thousand bushels a day. This is just the rig for a big farmer, as it takes only one man to look after the engine and separator. The engine starts very easily, and also shuts down in short order. They also have a complete line of stationary engines, many of which are in use in the district surrounding the city. It takes about one gallon of gasoline per horse power for ten hours to operate one of these engines, whether portable or stationary.

HART-PARR

The Hart-Parr gasoline traction engine was at the Regina exhibition for the first time last year and this season again Mr. Porter, who is well known in the city, came up from Portage to look after his exhibit. This is very handy and cheap power and the Hart-Parr had many admirers among the exhibition visitors.

FAIRBANKS-MORSE

The Canadian Fairbank Co. handles this make of engine. They had on the grounds a twenty-five horse power which had a very powerful appearance. They manufacture the stationary from two to two hundred horse power. The Regina agent is William Duff.

A NEW CONCERN

A very fine sample of goods which arrived only in time for the fair was the display of plows by the Canadian Racine Sattley Co. They make plows wagons and buggies. The exhibit was in charge of Capt. T. Blomhorn with W. Barber as demonstrator. Capt. Blomhorn is known to the public through his organization of the Canadian Moine Co. which he elected here some years ago. He now represents H. E. Miles, president of the American Manufacturers' Association, and from the interview given The West, which is published elsewhere in this issue, his coming to Regina where he will make his Canadian headquarters, is very significant at the present time. The company is now negotiating with Aid. Thos. Wilkinson for a large warehouse having truckage facilities on his present spur, and there is a likelihood of Capt. Blomhorn having this important agency established this winter. The Captain is prepossessing, full of business vigor and is very affable and there is no doubt that he will catch a leading place in the commercial race.

R. E. MICKLEBOROUGH

This firm had several large exhibits one of the principle ones being Wm. Gray & Sons carriages, cutters and buggies. They also handle road graders and the goods of the Manitoba Windmill and Pump Co. This, together with the Waterloo Engine exhibit mentioned elsewhere, made a very large display.

A REGINA PRODUCT

A new industry established recently in the city is the Regina Windmill and Pump Co. They had on exhibition a sample of their goods which is made after the Fort Wayne patent for which they have the exclusive privilege in Canada. This concern is

backed by local capital and gives promise of a bright future. There is a wide market for windmills in the west and the home factory that can deliver the goods can count on getting a share of the trade.

WESTERN MFG CO.

An exhibit which attracted a great deal of attention was the display of fanning mills and picklers by the Western Manufacturing Co. These machines are of their own home patent. The mills thoroughly separate and grade all kinds of seed, and even in cleaning the foulest kinds of seed has a capacity of forty bushels per hour. Each machine has five zinc sieves covered with a rubberine curtain, keeping oats and long kernels on the flat, and allowing wheat and smaller kernels to go through to be separated by wire sieves below. All noxious weed seeds are put in a box by themselves. The mills are made of the very best material, kiln dried. They have been four years on the market and is a ready seller. Mr. Delmater is the manager of this company, and J. S. Hunt, sales agent and demonstrator.

PETRIFFED STONE WORKS

Another home industry of growing importance to the building trade and for the employment of labor is the Petrifed Stone Works of this city, of which R. McMullen is proprietor. The plant is on Smith street along the C.N.R. tracks and employs six moulders continuously. The material which is used extensively in the city has a very handsome appearance, is as hard as granite, and has a variety of faces to suit the demands of different building designs.

DRILLS AND AUGERS

The Gus Peck Foundry and Mfg Co. had a fine display of rock drills and well augers, three of which were erected and one in operation, being driven by the Motor Tractor. This was a new feature among the machinery exhibits. The manager of the Regina branch house is B. Imhoff and W. O. Collins.

FOSTON AUTOMATIC

The Foston Automatic grain cleaner made a good display with several fanning mills.

SHARPLES

D. A. McDonald conducted an attractive exhibit under canvas consisting of Sharple's cream separators one of which was being driven by a neat little steam engine.

JUSTICE MEASURE

A new design for accurately measuring grain from threshing machines was exhibited by a Virden firm. The device is known as the Whitford Justice Measure. It has been inspected by the officers of the inland revenue department and stamped. This machine was operated by one of the International gasoline engines.
