CAMPBELL, Amos Wright, M.D., is a native of Brooklin, Ont., and commenced life as a teacher. He graduated M.D., at Victoria Univ., Cobourg, 1880, and after practising in Toronto; Gravenhurst and Orillia, successively, went to Chicago, 1893, where he has remained. He was apptd. CAMPBELL, Archibald Hamilton, business man, is the s. of John Campbell, W.S., by his wife, Frances Allen Brown, and was b. at Carbrook, Stirlingshire, Scot., Aug. 12, 1819, and ed. at the Edinburgh Acad. and Univ. Coming to Can., 1845, he entered the service of the Commercial Bank, M.D., of which he became cashier, a position he subsequently resigned to embark in lumbering at Peterborough. In 1874, having disposed of his mills and limits, he removed to Toronto, where he manages the Muskoka Mill and

Lumber Co.'s business, and is Presdt. of the Brit. Can. Loan and Invest. Co. He is Presdt. also of the Toronto Electric Co., and is connected with various other business organizations. A mem. of the Ch. of Eng., he has served as a del. to the Diocesan and Provl. Synods of the Ch., and was one of the founders of the Ch. Assn. designed to check the spread of Ritualism. He is also a dir. of Bp. Ridley Coll. Politically, a Con., he nevertheless favoured the Commercial Union movement, some years ago. He m. 1856, Louisa, young. dau. of Hy. CAMPBELL, Archibald William, Ont. public service, is the s. of J. C. Campbell, of Ekfrid, Ont., and was b. at Wardsville, Ont., 1863. Ed. on the local schs., he studied engineering in the office of the Co. Engr., Middlesex and Elgin, and under the City Engr. of St. Thomas, and graduated, 1885. Thereafter, he did an extensive business in municipal engineering, in partnership with Jas. A. Bell, St. Thomas. He was admitted to the Soc. of C. E's., 1888, became City Engr. of St. Thomas, 1891, and was, for some yrs. one of the editors of *The Municipal World*. He was a mem. of the Ont. Tax Roads Comm., and is now V.-P. of the Ont. Good Roads Assn. Is also a dir. of the Trusts and Guarantee Co. In June, 1896, he was apptd. by the Ont. Govt., Provl. Instructor in Roadmaking. *The Eng.
