It is by calculus that we determine its lines: accelerating track is very steep, enabling a take off; and the reception track is in such a way that the jumper makes contact with the snow in a tangental manner to transform the shock into a slide.

When we say a jumper jumped 125 feet, it is not 125 feet in height but the distance between the take off and the rear print mark of his skis.

Every ski jump has a different structure, and will throw a jumper in its trajectory. It follows that we cannot compare jumps on two different ski jumps. Jumpers are judged first, by their styles and secondly by the ordinary skis, with grooves running the whole length. (to give a better stability on the
