Ground loop occurred during dual night circuits and landings, when pilot after landing, turned off flare path, raised flaps and taxied into soft sand. The wheel of starboard undercarriage sank down and aircraft hosed over, damaging airscrew and engine cowling. Cause is attributed to pilot being insufficiently acquainted with flare path before commencement of flying. Categorized C
