Mr. Tremble kindly offered to place in his drug store, goods to be sold, and since November last, fresh supplies have been sent to him daily, where they are kept on ice, and may be obtained by any person desirous of purchasing them. This plan has worked admirably; the situation of the store (corner of St. Catherine and Mountain streets) is convenient for those who live uptown, and the kindness invariably shown by all with whom the workers have come in contact, cannot be too highly spoken of.
