## BATTLE OF HEIKOUTAI

Japanese Casualties 7,000—  
Russians Over 10,000.

Oyama's Attacking Force Expected to Be Annihilated, But By Charging Turned the Tables and Practically Annihilated Fourth Russian Regiment—Japs Charge Heavily With Mutilating Their Wounded—Operations Growing Larger.

Tokio, Feb. 4.—Manchurian headquarters, telegraphing Thursday, says that on that day the Russians resumed their activity in front of the Japanese left, and that there has been constant skirmishing along the fronts of both the opposing forces, exchanges of heavy artillery fire taking place. The Japanese again charged the Russians with mutilation of their wounded.

Portions of the report follow: "On Wednesday, Feb. 1, in the direction of the right, small bodies of the enemy attacked us in all directions. Our outposts repulsed them. On Thursday, Feb. 2, from 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. Russian artillery on the west front of Ta Mountain and Luchientun, shelled Fangshan and its vicinity. The Japanese again charged the Russians with mutilation of their wounded. Our artillery responded.

"In the direction of the centre on Thursday the enemy's artillery, situated about a mile and a quarter north of the village of Shakhie, and on Wengpao Mountain, bombarded the southern heights of Shakhie village. Constant collisions between scouts took place to the north of Chenglingtsu and Yaotun. In the direction of the left, on Thursday, the enemy's artillery fiercely bombarded Chenghiapao. Our artillery responded.

"The enemy has built a railroad from Suchiatun, which is five miles north of Lamutung, to Suhupao, and has opened traffic thereon. At eight o'clock on Thursday morning the enemy's field and heavy guns concentrated a fire against Yatsupao (two miles northeast of Chenghiapao). Subsequently a Russian division entered the village of Chengtung and despatched a brigade to attack us. We repulsed the brigade. Our pickets, consisting of an officer and 28 men, was surrounded near Huangshashatze, Jan. 26. Our picket retreated to the last, when most of the wounded surrendered. The enemy mutilated all our wounded."

Field Marshal Oyama's Report.

Field Marshal Oyama, telegraphing Thursday, reports that the extreme Japanese left holds a line along the Hun River, with its extreme left established on the right bank. The main body of the Russians, after their defeat at Heikoutai, retired across the Hun River and occupied Muypso, Shufangtai and a portion of Changtan. On Wednesday the Russians began constructing defensive works in the neighborhood of Shufangtai, Chungchiawopeng and Changtan. Russian cavalry patrols were seen Wednesday along the line of Tsuyuta, Pipasetz and Yuhpatozu. The Russians made a series of small attacks on the right army and the left flank of the left army, but were repulsed in each instance.

Details of the fighting from Jan. 25 to Jan. 29, which Field Marshal Oyama officially designates as the battle of Heikoutai, shows that the operations were more extensive, the forces engaged larger and the fighting more desperate than the first reports indicated. The Japanese casualties totaled 7,000. According to the Japanese estimate, the Russians lost over 10,000. The army fought in a driving snowstorm. It was bitterly cold and very difficult to see. A night attack delivered early in the morning brought success to the Japanese.

In his report Field Marshal Oyama says: "Our object had not been attained, so I encouraged all columns to make night attacks. All columns of the attacking force expected an-

ihilation. We attempted several attacks and movements, but suffered heavily by the enemy's artillery, especially the machine guns. All columns continued the attack with all their might. The enemy, unable to withstand our vigorous attacks, began to retreat at 5.30 in the morning. Our forces, charging into Heikoutai, occupied the place firmly and entirely at 9.30 o'clock in the morning."

The Russian force engaged is estimated by the Japanese at seven divisions, with a division of cavalry. Prisoners report that the Fourth Russian Infantry Regiment was practically annihilated.

Russians Lose 100.  
St. Petersburg, Feb. 4.—The Emperor has received the following despatch from Gen. Kuropatkin: "The Japanese, during the night of Jan. 31, attacked Diantanchen, on the left bank of the Hun River, opposite Changtan. They captured the village, but subsequently were driven out with great loss. The Russian casualties were 100. The Japanese after a severe cannonade, re-attacked our forces at Diantanchen at noon Feb. 1. The Russians first retired, but ultimately re-occupied the village. Although some outlying parts are still in the hands of the enemy. Up to Feb. 1, 133 Japanese prisoners have arrived at Mukden."

## 40,000 MEN ON STRIKE.

They Forcibly Drag Their Bosses to Place of Meeting—Bloody Riot At Leds.

Sosonovica, Feb. 4.—About 40,000 men are now out on strike. At a meeting of strikers yesterday the men forcibly dragged officials belonging to the management of various concerns to the place of meeting. All the speakers insisted on the preservation of order. The men's demands included a minimum wage of 75c a day, eight hours to constitute a day's work, various reforms to factory management and old age pensions. After the meeting 12,000 strikers marched six miles to the Dombred district in perfect order, but everywhere persuading workmen to strike. Yesterday afternoon strikers went to the railway station of Streshemshiz, seized and bound the officials, wrecked the station buildings and stopped trains in both directions.

## Bloody Riot At Leds.

Berlin, Feb. 4.—The Lokal Anzeiger's Warsaw correspondent reports that at Leds there was a bloody encounter on Friday, the military firing on strikers and causing great havoc. In the fight several days ago, the correspondent says, sixteen strikers were killed and fifty-eight wounded, of whom thirty-eight were severely injured.

## Baryas Take a Hand.

Moscow, Feb. 4.—At a private meeting of the Provincial nobility yesterday, after a discussion of the reform propositions, it was decided to vote for a modified form of address to the Government to the effect that the nobility are eagerly awaiting a word from the Emperor which would show that the bonds uniting the throne and the people are still unbroken and the Emperor would, when he deemed advisable, summon elected representatives of the people to participate in the Government.

## CZAR APPEARS AGAIN.

Receives Deputation of Five Workmen At Tsarskoe Selo.

London, Feb. 4.—A news agency despatch from St. Petersburg says Emperor Nicholas yesterday received at Tsarskoe Selo, a deputation of five workmen from the State Printing Works. His Majesty questioned each man closely regarding the character of the work and hours of employment, expressed satisfaction with those who had conscientiously performed their duty and said he hoped to visit the establishment in person. The audience took place in the great hall. His Majesty, in dismissing the delegation, asked them to convey thanks in his name to their comrades, who had done good work in the service of the state. He expressed satisfaction with the hearing of the delegates.

## To Try Gorki.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 4.—It is the intention of the Government to bring Maxim Gorki and seven other political and publicists to trial on political charges. General Trepoff, who received the Associated Press yesterday, said: "The whole case is now in the hands of the Ministry of Justice, which is conducting the investigation, at the conclusion of which the procurator general will decide whether the prisoners shall be tried by a civil or a military court."

## Lozs, Russian Poland, Feb. 4.—In

a conflict between troops and strikers at the Kounitzer factory here yesterday, the former fired, killing six persons and wounding 48. Shooting also occurred at the Keller lace factory.

## Gorki Still Locked Up.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 4.—The report of Maxim Gorki's release is incorrect. Three of the eight members of the delegation to Interior Minister Sviatopolk-Mirsky—Hesson, Miskotin, and Karcliff—who were arrested Jan. 21, have been released provisionally, pending an investigation.

## MINN EXPERT INJURED.

Frank Cochran, Mentioned For Cabinet Portfolio, Loses Right Leg.

Toronto, Feb. 4.—Frank Cochran, a well-known mining expert of Sudbury, met with an accident Thursday by which he lost a leg. He was returning on the Soo Express from Toronto and alighted at Wabash for a few minutes. In attempting to board the moving train he fell between the coaches and caught the coupling pins as he fell, holding on

The arbitrators held several sittings in Toronto, commencing Saturday, January 7. Hon. Edward Blake was the arbitrator for the Newfoundland Government. Mr. Donald MacMaster of Montreal, representing the Reid interests, and Mr. P. S. Archibald was the third arbitrator. Each side bears its own costs, about \$50,000.

## Twenty Families Burned Out.

New York, Feb. 4.—Twenty families were driven from their homes in their night clothes, two firemen were overcome by smoke, and rescued with great difficulty, and one girl is thought to have perished in a fire which destroyed a five-story apartment house in the Bronx, early yesterday.
