SANDWICH THE CHAMPIONS.

"We congratulate you boys," said Captain Sissons, of the Chatham Club as he shook hands with the captain of the Sandwich team at the conclusion of the final cup game. "We gave you the best we had and you won upon your merits."

And the Chatham players led off in three cheers for the new cup-winners.

The Walker vase, representing the championship of the Peninsula Football League, goes to Sandwich as a result of the match yesterday in which that team defeated Chatham in a hardly contested game by a score of three goals to nil. One goal scored by Chatham was disputed and disallowed, but it would not have affected the ultimate result.

For once Captain Sissons' good fortune deserted him and Chatham lost the toss. There was a very strong wind blowing right down the field and Sandwich elected to play with it. The Chatham players therefore lined up with the breeze blowing smartly in the teeth. On the kick-off Kellington and Angus took possession of the ball and made a clever combination excursion into Sandwich territory. Williams, the stalwart Sandwich back, met the attack and cleared splendidly.

Then started a brilliant siege of the Chatham citadel that did not terminate until half-time. The Sandwich forward line was strengthened by three new players and, with the wind, they worked magnificently. Chatham's defence worked like Trojan and at times did fine work. Baker in goal made some particularly clever stops. Sandwich, however, were not to be repulsed, and about 30 minutes after the start the ball was scrambled through.

The Sandwich spectators were now wildly enthusiastic and ten minutes later when Sills headed through their second goal from a centre by Brady, pandemonium broke loose. A few minutes later the ball was again scrambled through for a third goal.

At half-time the score stood Sandwich 3, Chatham 0.

On changing ends Chatham secured the wind and the entire game changed. Not once was Baker called on to touch the ball in the second half and the attack was continually on the Sandwich posts. But the Chatham forwards failed to utilize their chances and corner after corner fell to them without avail.

One disputed point occurred shortly after the commencement of the second half. Kellington headed in a beauty from a corner kick and on the rebound Angus sent in a hot shot which the goal umpire allowed as a goal. Sandwich, however, disputed that it did not go through and in the crowd it seemed impossible to ascertain, opinions being divided. Referee McDonald disallowed the goal, subject to appeal.

A few moments later Messer made a fine centre and Kellington headed it right into the posts, but Laing made a sensational save. Following this Captain Sissons, who was crowded up with the defence on the attack, sent in a scorcher that Laing saved only by making a corner.

The attack continued till time was called, but try as they would, the Chathamites could not get the ball through.

It was a clean, hard fast game, one of the most exciting yet seen on the Sandwich grounds.
