He made up his mind to apply to an insurance company for an insurance policy of 200,-000 fr. The insurance was effected in Venice, and the company declared that they were doubly happy to insure such a personage and to be able to tell him that he was in excellent health. The Pope's medical attendant in Venice was Dr. Pietro da Venezia. The doctor was present when His Holiness fainted on the 11th of August in the Pauline Chapel. He declared that he lately had occasion to examine the Pope repeatedly, and that he found him quite healthy, but that His Holiness had fatigued himself in


