May Engage Nuns to Teach

An important decision that defeats the efforts of A.P.A. agitators in Ro-chester, N.Y., has lately been render-ed by the Court of Appeals, which has affirmed the judgment of the low-er courts in the James Sargent case n which that Rochester man sought to have the Rochester Board of Education restrained from paying the salaries of four Sisters of St. Joseph, who were teaching children Mary's and St. Patrick's Orphan Asylums in secular subjects.

The opinion was written by Judge O'Brien, his associates concurring. The decision settles for all time in that state the right of a municipality to furnish secular education to orphans in Catholic, Jewish or other asylums where the religion of the children is also taught them, and also the right of the asylum to dealso the right of the asylum to demand the necessary contribution.
