And then the engrossed Bill from the Legislative Council, intituled, An Act to prevent the abuse of oppositions afin d'annuller, afin de distraire, and afin de charge," was read for the first time.

Mr. Bedard moved, seconded by Mr. Bourdages, that a Committee of seven Members be appointed to search for, and enquire upon the constitutional points and Parliamentary usages, mentioned in the answer made by His Excellency the Governor in Chief, to the humble Address of this House to His Excellency, presented to day by this House to His Excellency, and to report with all convenient speed.

The House divided upon the question, and the names being called for, they were taken down as follows:
