WILL FIGHT ATTEMPT TO HAVE RAILWAY GO CATARACT INTERESTS

Mayor Spence Declared This Morning City Has Had Enough Dealings With Cataract---Will Sale of Railway be Made?---Latest Developments.

As reported in the Courier last night, General Manager Coleman f the Dominion Power & Transmission Company, was in Brantford yesterday, looking over the street railway situation, and it was conirmed to-day by civic authorities that the Cataract interests would likely make an offer for the railway. In this connection the railway would prove of advantage to the company, in that a new source would be secured for the sale of power. It is well known that if the city secures control Hydro power will be used.

Mayor Spence, when seen this morning, announced the city's attitude very plainly. "This city," his Worship said, "has had one greement with the Dominion Power & Transmission Company, and loesn't want another. We will fight such a sale at every turn, because it is not desirable to have Brantford again tied up hard and foot to a corporation which has by its policy here in the past shown little if any regard for public interests.'

Yesterday it was decided in the courts that, pending likelihood of a sale, the matter would not be disposed of until February 16. If sale is not made in that time the franchise will become forfeited. The city proposes to make a move, but what it is would not be divulged to-day. There was a conference lasting until midnight last night, and the matter will be brought up in the City Council Monday evening. It was the opinion of the city guardians this morning that o sale of the railway would be effected. If that prediction turns out be true, the chances are favorable toward the forfeit of the franhise, as announced by the judges yesterday. With the franchise forfeited certainly no sale would be made, because the city will refuse to grant another franchise, but will make a settlement with the mortgagees and bondholders and assume possession.
